

CONTROVERSY OVER PARKING OF MOTORS NOW INVOLVES CITY

Complaint against taxi drivers parking their machines in front of the Oregon building, High and State streets, made by Hawkins & Roberts, owners of the building, to police has developed into a topic involving the city attorney, the Oregon Electric and police officials.

The complaint was made by the owners of the building because they say persons are unable to get to the streetcars when the taxis stand there. Agent J. W. Ritchie, of the Oregon Electric, issued a written statement Tuesday night authorizing the drivers to park their machines in front of the building.

WHISKEY TAKEN FROM COURT IS EXPENSIVE

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 30.—Pleading guilty of unlawful possession of liquor, Charles G. Heffner, former democratic state chairman, admitted this morning that he had taken a sack of whiskey from Superior Judge Clay Allen's court room on June 4 "for a humanitarian purpose, to give to sick relatives and friends."
