## Prince of Wales Received at White House But Fails to See President Wilson

Washington, Nov. 11.—The Prince of Wales called at the White House today but stayed only a few minutes. He did not see the president and left after chatting with Mrs. Wilson and Miss Margaret Wilson, the president's daughter.

The prince will call at the executive mansion again Thursday, when he will probably see the president and take tea with members of the Wilson family.

Aboard Prince of Wales Train, 12th Route to Washington, Nov. 11.—The Prince of Wales' arrival in the United States was devoid of any suggestion of "hands across the sea," rather, it savored of "all hands round," in its utter democracy and dearth of formality.

Arriving at Rouse Point last night, just inside the American border, the prince readily acceded to an insistent demand from the villagers to shake hands. He used his left hand for this purpose, explaining that "I've done a lot of that with the right lately."

Prince Edward, a lighting from the special train, touched American soil for the first time in fifty-nine years and some months after his illustrious grandfather, who later Edward VII, arrived in America. The entire population of the town was down at the dimly lighted little station to assist the prince's reception committee in greeting the royal guest. The committee, mostly worn silk hats, the town folks caps with ear muffs to protect themselves from the biting wind.

A cheer went up as the prince stepped to the platform and the Sixty-third infantry band played "God Save the King" and "The Star Spangled Banner." Edward stood at attention and the guard of honor presented arms.

Secretary Lansing then strode forward and shook the prince's hand, after which the other members of the committee and the villagers had their innings squeezing the royal digits.

"By gosh, he's a regular guy," shouted one citizen. "TH bet they'd about him king if it came to that."

The special train pulled out for Washington at 9 o'clock.

## COLLISION WITH CAR WRECKS AUTOMOBILE

A delivery car of the Yew Park grocery was wrecked and strewn No. 82 driven by Motorman Dotts was slightly damaged in a collision late last night at the corner of Mission and Twelfth streets.

Kelley Wolf, said to have been driving the auto, drove the car into the standing streetcar, police said. He came at a fast rate of speed west on Mission, police reported, and turned north on Twelfth, dashing into the streetcar. No one was injured.

## MINERS FIGHT NOT TO DIE, SAYS HARRISON

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 11.—The formal declaration of peace will bring with it a new strike order to the coal miners of America in the opinion of William L. Harrison, president of the Alabama Federation of Labor, who today characterized the injunction of the federal court as the "ranked, most flagrant outrage ever perpetrated against free people."

"The fight has only begun," said Harrison. "It is only temporarily halted. As soon as we find out that the war is over, we are going to see to it that so far as the mine workers are concerned, the fight is going on until they are given the fullest degree of justice and liberty that they are entitled to as free American citizens."

## BERGER ANNOUNCES RE-ELECTION PLANS

The celebration, opened when the Sixth division regulars in Grant Park began firing a battery of 75s.

## Oklahoma Guard to Withdraw When Men Return To Mines

Oklahoma, City, Okla., Nov. 11.—"The national guard will be withdrawn from the mine fields as soon as a sufficient number of miners return to work," Governor Robertson announced today following receipt of the news that the strike order had been recalled.

The miners have not yet received word of the action at the Indianapolis meeting. A report from Krebs in the heart of the McClaster fields, indicated that as soon as the order was received officially a meeting of miners would be called to determine the course to be followed.
