"Ireland was generally regarded as pro-German during the war," they said.

Jobs For Service Men Investigated By Officer

An investigation to determine the feasibility of reviving federal employment offices throughout the United States is being conducted by the war department. Gilbert G. Hall, representing the government and conducting the investigation on the coast, was in Salem today gathering data on the labor situation. He found that the condition was good here now, but may change for the worse during the winter months.

He said that the condition in Portland and Spokane is particularly bad. Much unemployment, Mr. Hall said, makes it imperative that some assistance must be rendered in these two cities.
