

RESERVE SUPPLIES OF COAL EXHAUSTED AT END OF 3RD WEEK

Chicago, Nov. 21.—As the third week of the coal strike ended today, reserve supplies of fuel in this section had practically vanished. Widespread suspension of industrial works is already under way, the regional fuel committee announced.

The Corn Products plant at Pekin, Ill., has closed and the company announced that the Argo plant would have to close tomorrow. The company employed about 3000 persons and used 100,000 bushels of corn daily.

The Alton Brick company will also suspend tomorrow.

Trains scheduled on lines running from Chicago have been chopped to the minimum. Hundreds of trains daily were suspended. All lines were affected.

The packing plants have a two weeks' coal supply on hand.

GERMANY PLACED AT MERCY OF FRANCE BY TREATY REJECTION

Berlin, Nov. 20.—(Delayed.)—Refusal of the American senate to ratify the peace treaty means not only that the smaller nations of Europe will desert the league of nations, but that Germany will be left at the mercy of France, German government officials said today.

"It is essential that something be done at once to relieve the present confusion," a high official in the foreign office said. "What Germany wants most is peace."

The pan-Germans, however, hail possible final defeat of the treaty in America as an opportunity for a separate peace with the United States, with subsequent German-American alliance.

Rejection of the treaty by the Americans pleased the reactionaries in Germany as nothing else could.

Union Record Owners Seek To Regain Paper Thru Court

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 21.—The legal battle to regain possession of the Seattle Union Record plant, now in the custody of the United States marshal, was commenced Thursday before Commissioner R. W. McClelland. John F. Dore and Mark M. Litchman, representing the newspaper, attacked the legal sufficiency of the search warrants which authorized the federal authorities to seize the Union Record plant last Friday.

Union Record attorneys stated that the newspaper is incurring heavy financial losses through the seizure of its property.

22 Alleged I.W.W. Members Indicted in Portland

Portland, Or., Nov. 21.—Twenty two alleged I. W. W. were indicted by the grand jury here Thursday afternoon on charges of having violated the state criminal syndicalism law.

The indictments are the result of a raid which was conducted by department of justice operators here a week ago when 58 alleged industrialists were arrested while conducting a meeting.

Fire Truck Wrecked; One Man Killed, Two Injured

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 21.—One fireman is dead, another lies in the city hospital with both legs broken and a third man is suffering from painful bruises and lacerations as the result of the wrecking of a hook and ladder truck responding to a false alarm.

Peter Coughlin, 40, a truck man, was crushed to death when the truck, with its steering gear broken, slowed across the street car tracks at First avenue south and Railway Way and crashed into a streetcar.

BELLINGHAM YOUTHS CONFESS TO MURDER

Bellingham, Nov. 21.—Twelve hours after Lee Linton, Everett taxi driver, was found murdered in a ditch near Everett, deputy sheriffs walked into a Bellingham rooming house and arrested Leon White, 18, and Joseph D. Morten, 20, of Stanwood, whom deputies say, have confessed to the crime.


The arrests were made last night, after Linton's taxi had been traced to Bellingham.

According to police here, the youths have admitted planning the murder and robbery of Linton and also intended to burglarize a grocery store at Florence.

"Then were were going to Mexico," one of the boys is alleged to have said.
