

RESTRICTION RULES ON NON-CONFERENCE COLLEGES IS PASSED

The Independent College President's association of Oregon in the convention at Philomath last Friday and Saturday, adopted a resolution to restrict inter-collegiate athletics in such a way that they will not interfere with intramural sports. This resolution, which will be presented to the proper authorities at each institution, suggests that all athletics be under the control of the faculty, or the member of the faculty who has charge of physical training. There shall be no paid coaches, and no admission shall be charged to the games. The expenses shall be provided for in the college budget.

It is thought that this resolution will have little effect on the policy at Willamette University, where every student engages in some form of athletics at the present time, and where everything suggested by the conference is now being carried out, except as regards charging admission.

The principal topic discussed at the conference was the inter-church world movement, and the duty of the college in training men and women for service in foreign countries, in missionary and reconstruction work.

Officers were elected for the coming year. President Clarke of Pacific university was elected president, President Sanderson of Eugene Bible university, vice-president; Professor T. G. Franklin of Willamette university, secretary-treasurer, and President Riley of McMinnville college, representative of the state board of standardization.

The association will meet again at call of the president, probably at Portland, December 10 to 12, in connection with the meeting of the inter-church world movement.

VARSITY DEBATERS TO COMPETE FOR TROPHY

J. Fred McGrew, forensic manager at Willamette university, announced yesterday that a prominent attorney of Salem had offered a cup to be given to the class winning first place in the inter-class debate this year. The debates will be on the same subject as the inter-collegiate contests, and will be held before the tryout for the varsity team, so that a large amount of material will be developed. Each class signified its intention of entering a team.

There will also be a series of debates between the literary societies, in competition for the cup which is now in the university. These inter-society debates were an annual affair several years ago, but none has been held for three years.

Twenty-one other indicted men also will appear on that date, it was announced.

'PHONE MEN TURN DOWN WAGE OFFER; STRIKE IS VOTED

San Francisco, Dec. 2.—Electrical workers of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, have voted by a small majority rejecting the recent wage agreement effected by their international officers and voting for a strike, according to an announcement by T. C. Vickers, representing the international.

The vote was by only about 20 per cent of the membership and it is believed, Vickers said, that a strike will not result.

Employees in Oregon, Washington and Nevada voted against the agreement and also against the strike. California voted against the agreement, but favored the strike.

The totals follow: For agreement 139; against agreement 446; for strike 356; against strike 252; for telephone federation 245; against telephone federation 245. Eighteen of the 32 locals went in votes. Two local unions' votes arrived too late to be counted.

Vickers explained that because of the lack of interest shown in the matter he had laid the whole question before International President Noonan at Springfield.

LADY ASTOR ASSUMES SEAT IN PARLIAMENT

London, Dec. 1.—(United Press.)—The first woman member of parliament was sworn in this afternoon.

Lady Nancy Astor, American-born wife of Viscount Waldorf Astor, took the oath of allegiance to King George and parliament shortly after four o'clock.

Hearty cheers greeted Lady Astor as she advanced to the chair. The clerk announced "the honorable member from Sutton, Plymouth, sir." James W. Lowther, speaker of the house, a dignified figure in wig and gown, arose with a courtly smile and bowed. The "honorable member" bowed, smiled a little, grasped the speaker's hand and repeated the oath of allegiance. The "right hand of fellowship" and the viscountess was formally admitted to membership in the house of commons.

REPLACING ALIENS BY SERVICE MEN FAVORED

Expulsion of all aliens, and particularly Japanese, from jobs in Salem to make way for unemployed ex-service men when the shortage of work becomes so acute that former soldiers are apt to be thrown out of work, was favored in action taken last night by Capital Post No. 9, American Legion. The legionnaires met in the armory, and about 150 members were present. The meeting night of the legion was changed from the first Monday night of each month to the first Tuesday night of each month.

The Red Cross, in resolutions adopted by the men, was asked to aid as far as possible destitute legionnaires. This action was taken by the post when the knowledge that winter and the cessation of much work would oust many ex-soldiers from work.

Sixty Radicals Deported In Past Two Years, Report

Washington, Dec. 2.—Sixty radical aliens have been deported from the United States in the last two years, the department of labor reported to congress.

Deportation of eight others has been ordered, the department said. Total arrests on deportation warrants numbered 697 during the same period. The figures do not include those that were caught in the recent red raids, the report being only to November 1.
