Claiming that his wife, Annie M. Richards, violated her marriage vows by holding illegal association with another man, Albert A. Richards today filed suit against her for divorce. Mr. and Mrs. Richards were married here on Christmas day, 1905; and have two children, Lucile, 6, and Goldie, 11. Mr. Richards asks the custody of the children.

Two foreigners today signed papers at the court house indicating their intention of becoming citizens of the United States. They are Walter Van Flus, 26, a farmer residing at Silverton. He is a Swiss. And Frank Perker, 52, a subject of Canada, residing on a farm near Donald.

Briton Leads Frenchman In Plane Race To Australia

London, Dec. 4.—The race between Captain Ross Smith, British aviator, and Etienne Poulet, French, in their attempted flights to Australia, had narrowed down to a 45 minutes margin in favor of the British flier, according to latest reports received by the air ministry here today.

Smith overtook the French before Poulet reached Rangoon and arrived in that city, 45 minutes ahead, a dispatch to the air ministry said. The aviators both reached Rangoon, November 30, and planned to leave December 1 for Bangkok, according to a dispatch.

The distance from Rangoon, one of the chief cities of the Indian province of Burma, to Bangkok, capital of Siam is about 340 miles.

Reported Betrayal Of Villa Still Unconfirmed

El Paso, Texas, Dec. 4.—(United Press.)—A rumor that Francisco Villa had been betrayed by his own men, taken prisoner and had been offered to the Carranzista commander at Parral; if the standing reward of fifty thousand pesos would first be paid, was still unconfirmed officially here early today. No credence was given the rumor in official quarters here or in Juarez, although the rumor originated with a Carranzista railroad man.

Mexican Consul Andres Garcia said he replied to his messages asking confirmation of Villa's capture.
