Freedom Of Speech Promised To Faculty By New U. C. Head

Berkeley, Cal., Dec. 4.—Freedom of speech and of research for members of the faculty of the University of California was promised by David P. Barrows, newly elected president of the institution. In the first statement he has issued since his election, "The old, fine tradition of freedom of teaching, of the expression of public activities and of the expression of views will be maintained," said President Barrow. "The only restraint required will be the restraint becoming a gentleman."

President Barrow's statement was given significance by the fact that bolshevism had been taught and advocated in the faculty and student body.
