

SPANISH WAR VETS FAVOR RETURNING LAW FOR HANGING

Hal Hibbard Camp, No. 5, Spanish War Veterans, in a recent meeting passed a resolution favoring the amendment of state laws that will reinstate capital punishment in Oregon.

The resolutions passed follows: WHEREAS, the people of the State of Oregon are at the present time suffering from an unprecedented number of serious crimes, and

WHEREAS, it is generally recognized by the courts and present attorneys of the State of Oregon that no adequate law exists for the punishment of such crimes, and particularly for the punishment of murder; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, by Hal Hibbard Camp, No. 5, United Spanish War Veterans, in meeting regularly assembled, that we favor the adoption of a constitutional amendment repealing the amendment of section 35, article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, prohibiting capital punishment, so that said section when amended shall provide that capital punishment shall be reinstated in the State of Oregon; and be it

RESOLVED, that we urge every good citizen of the State of Oregon to join us and all other agencies working for the same cause in bringing about the amendment to the constitution herein mentioned; and be

FURTHER RESOLVED, that we, the members of Hal Hibbard Camp No. 5, do hereby tender our services to the State, County, or Municipal authorities for the preserving of law and order, and do hold ourselves subject to call of such officers at any time.

"Y" WOULD APPLY WAR EXPERENCES TO CIVIL PROBLEMS

San Francisco, Dec. 3.—The application of certain types of activities developed in the war work experience to industrial life and community welfare is to be an outstanding feature of the Y. M. C. A.'s future program, states E. A. McCarl, executive secretary, western department, National War Work council, who has just returned from Detroit, where he attended the 46th international convention of the association.

The opportunity for this class of service," McCarl explains, "presents a challenge to the best efforts of every worker and friend of the Red Triangle. It means not less service to those with whom the association worked in the pre-war period but greater service to those who were not reached by the former program.

Recreation Planned. Industrial groups will begin recreational educational facilities similar to those employed with the A. E. F. and in the home training camps. Music and motion pictures will be prominent factors in this work. Some adaptation of the "hut" activities idea, providing a social and recreational neighborhood center will be encouraged. The central thought will be to apply modern morale-building methods to civil as well as to military life.

Among other significant features of the convention were the approval of an extension of the educational program, especially the plan of providing free scholarships for returned soldiers, and the adoption of a plan for a retirement fund for Y. M. C. A. secretaries. The relation of the association to the church was also more clearly defined.

Organize Permanently. "Probably the most dramatic moment of the week was when eight hundred of the workers, overseas and home, representing all walks of American business and professional life, who had assembled at a reunion banquet, adopted a plan for perpetuating their fellowship in a permanent organization and registered their continued loyalty to the principles of the association.

"One of the finest tributes the 'Y' received was from Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, who spoke to the delegates for more than an hour and officially commended the work of the association in the warmest terms.

Other prominent speakers included Major General C. P. Summerall, U. S. A.; Col. Mason S. Joy, U. S. A.; Commander C. B. Mayo, U. S. N.; Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers; William Sloan, Dr. John R. Mott and George Sherwood Eddy of New York and a number of leading clergymen and laymen from various sections of the country."
