

### PATROL EXTENSION TO ALL NORTHWEST SOUGHT BY OLCOTT

As a result of the success of the airplane forest patrol in Oregon during last summer patrol protection agencies have asked that the patrol be extended in 1920 to cover the state of Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California and western Wyoming, according to a letter forwarded by Governor Oldcott Thursday to the governors of the other states to which the patrol would be applied.

"I had occasion to observe the work of airplanes in locating forest fires the past summer and, as a result of such observation, feel very strongly that the patrol should be continued in this state," Governor Oldcott writes in urging the executives of other states to use their influence in obtaining an extension of the patrol service.

"If it can, a contemplated, be conducted in all northwestern states so much the better, and if all demand it there would seem to be good reason to believe the service will be furnished."

Colonel H. H. Arnold of San Francisco, in charge of the air service for the western department, U. S. army, has recommended to the war department that five observation squadrons of 18 planes each with the necessary hangars, motor transportation, tentage for the officers and men be provided for patrol work in the six northwestern and Pacific coast states during 1920.

### VOTING MACHINE IS APPROVED BY BOARD

The voting machine manufactured by the Automatic Registering Machine corporation, Jamestown, New York, has been approved by the state board of examiners for voting machines as meeting the requirements of the law passed by the last legislature and named by this approval are now being forwarded to the election officials in all cities of more than 4000 people, according to the provisions of the state law.

### League Body Would End Right To Fight

Brussels, Dec. 5.—The convention of European and Asiatic societies favoring a league of nations, which opened here Monday, passed a resolution favoring drafting of an international law eliminating the right to make war.

The convention also adopted a resolution favoring an international compulsory organization to pass upon all different interpretations of the peace treaty.

### Decision Upon American League Scrap Due Today

New York, Dec. 5.—American league members probably can study time tables tonight. Justice Greenbaum of the supreme court is expected to decide late this afternoon which is the annual league meeting—the one Ban Johnson called for December 10 in Chicago or the one the board of directors called for the same day in New York.

The injunction restraining Johnson and the presidents of the Cleveland and St. Louis clubs from attending the proposed Chicago meeting was heard yesterday afternoon, but decision was reserved.

It was said here today that the decision might be irrelevant to the cause as Johnson and his five "faithful clubs" were planning to come to the New York meeting and face the enemy on its home lot.

### Allies To Seize Frankfurt And Essen If Pact Refused

London, Dec. 5.—The allies intend to occupy Frankfurt and Essen if Germany refuses to accept the protocol to the peace treaty, an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Paris today said. It was reliably reported there.

### SWIMMER ADDS TO GLORY

Honolulu, Dec. 5.—Norman Ross, America's noted swimmer, broke another record here when he made a new haul for the 300 yard tank swim of 2:06.2-5. He held the previous record of 2:06.4-5.

### INDIANS LEAD POSSE IN SEARCH OF BROWN

San Bernardino, Cal., Dec. 5.—Indian trailers early today were leading a posse of heavily armed deputy sheriffs through the desert brush near Victorville on the trail of Art Brown, one of the two Brown brothers wanted for the robbery of the Hellman bank in Los Angeles.

The posse under Sheriff Shay of San Bernardino county encountered Art Brown with his wife and children driving over the desert 20 miles from Victorville at 1:30 a. m. today.

Brown leaped from the machine and a moment later opened fire on the officers from the brush at the roadside. A hot exchange of shots followed but Brown escaped across the desert in the darkness.

Brown's wife and three children, the automobile and two suitcases containing a quantity of money were taken in charge by members of the posse who started back for San Bernardino.

### CHICAGO'S LAST COAL DOLED OUT; SUPPLY IS SHORT

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Bituminous coal burning furnaces were virtually banked today while the last reserves of fuel were doled out to those industries essential to the life of the people.

When the order cutting passenger train schedules between Chicago and the Pacific coast goes into effect Monday at 12:01 a. m. approximately 15,000 trains monthly will be eliminated. This will amount to approximately 8,000,000 passenger train miles in thirty days.

Packing houses here, operating on a curtailed schedule, will not be allotted additional coal, the regional committee ordered. When present supplies are exhausted they will have to shut down.

The coal supply at the army hospital at Fort Sheridan was reported about exhausted.

Various plans for increasing coal production were placed into effect in several states today.

Governor J. B. Robertson of Oklahoma planned to dig coal in mines near McAlester today with 400 other volunteer miners.

Governor Gardner of Missouri today planned to start volunteers digging coal in the strip mines of Barton county.

### TUG AND 2 SUBS WITH CREWS MAY BE LOST

New York, Dec. 5.—The schooner Mary A. Lynch was sunk in East river here today when run down by a report of a tug boat, according to a report to the marine division of the police department. All the schooner's crew but her captain were reported drowned. Police patrol boats were rushed to the scene.

### Blum Estate Pays \$1,500 Inheritance Tax To State

A check for \$1610.32 in payment of the inheritance tax from the Rosa Blum estate, Portland, was received by State Treasurer Hoff, Thursday. This represents an increase of \$24 over the tax which the state would have received under the appraisement originally filed with the treasurer's office. Under protest from the executor the appraisement was increased by the courts from \$63,670 to \$95,000, the increase being sustained by the Multnomah county court in a decision rendered Wednesday.

### Crazed Father Kills Wife And Self; Children Battered

Passaic, N. J., Dec. 5.—Two little girls and a boy, their heads battered and faces bruised, were taken to a hospital here today when the father of the 18 hours in their home here beside the bodies of their mother and father and their sister.

One of the girls recovered sufficient to drag herself to a telephone and call a doctor. It was only then the discovery was made that Mason R. Strong, an architect, had suddenly gone insane Tuesday night, killed his wife and a daughter with an axe, seriously wounded the other three children and slashed his throat with a razor.
