OLCOTT APPROVES CIVILIAN RESERVE ORGANIZATION PLAN

The Civilian Reserve now under process of organization in this state is given the official endorsement of the executive officer in a letter by Governor Olcott to Eugene E. Smith of Portland, state legislator and publisher of Labor Opinion. The letter is in reply to a request for information regarding the organization and for an expression as to the governor's attitude toward the reserve.

"I consider that there is a need for such an organization," Governor Olcott writes. "Not any immediate need, perhaps, but a necessity for having in reserve a body of highly patriotic citizens who will refuse to see life sacrificed and property destroyed at the whim of distoyal and criminal aliens and agitators."

"The civilian reserve is authorized by the laws of this state, being nothing more or less than the unorganized militia as recognized by our laws creating the military department of our state government. The reserve would be of great value to this office in functioning to preserve community peace and aid in law enforcement should any situation arise beyond the control of the regularly constituted authorities and the national guard. I do not look for any such situation and it would be most deplorable if such a situation should ever come to exist but it would be much more deplorable if such a situation would arise and our regularly constituted authorities and the national guard could not cope with it. Inasmuch as this reserve is the unorganized militia as provided for by law and such functions directly under the executive office, I think no fear need be felt that it will ever be called into active duty unless the gravest and most urgent necessity required."
