MOTHERS STORY OF DAUGHTER'S DEATH NOT WHOLLY CLEAR

Yreka, Cal., Dec. 8.—Unexplained features of the Lawton (Mich.) trunk mystery served to cloud today the detailed statement by Mrs. Sarah Tabor in which she said her daughter Maud died in her arms three years ago. Maud's body was found in the trunk. Mrs. Tabor said she did not know the body had been embalmed. She did not explain how she placed the body in the trunk unassisted although she intimated she had done so. She said her son Walter, Joseph Virgo and Florence Cichlow were not present when Maud died.
Chloroform Blamed.
Maud was addicted to the use of chloroform, and died from an overdose, according to Mrs. Tabor. The two had agreed to preserve the body of the one dying first until the bodies of both could be buried together, according to Mrs. Tabor's statement.
Mrs. Tabor did not explain how this pact could have been fulfilled. She had told no one of it, she said. It was pointed out that if she herself had died on her extended western trip before the trunk was discovered she would have been buried without any reference to the alleged "death pact." Mrs. Tabor and Walter are being held for the arrival of Michigan officers.

LEGION POST FORMED BY AURORA VETERANS

Tuesday night a call was sent out for all local men who had been in service during the world war, to meet and discuss the formation of a Post of the American Legion. A temporary organization was effected which is to be made into a permanent organization as soon as a charter is granted. By unanimous vote it was named the Jonas and Edwin Deetz Post in memory of the Deetz brothers who gave their lives for their country.
Temporary officers were chosen to serve until the first annual meeting which will be early in January. Officers chosen were Dr. R. F. Bell, president; Albert Ehlen, vice-president; Henry Zimmerman, secretary; Robert Hinman, treasurer; H. V. Skinner, historian; R. A. Stevens, chaplain. The committee consisted of Heinz A. Shilmin, Wm. Keil, C. Collins, E. Collins.
A temporary constitution was adopted and the second Thursday of this month (December) was chosen for a special meeting to perfect the organization.—Observer.

Booze Business Thrives In St. Louis Where Ban Is Lifted

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 8.—St. Louis was in the oasis business today. Caravans of the thirty from all surrounding states made this their mecca. The procession of "camels" began arriving early after word went out that Federal Judge Paris had restrained United States authorities from enforcing war time prohibition against the removal from bond and sale of whiskey.
Liquor habits of other days were unlocked within an hour after the temporary injunction was ordered by Judge Paris. Candles and benzene lamps, necessitated by fuel conservation orders, added color to the reappearance of John Barleycorn's ghost. White aproned barkeeps were back at their old stands early today. Business was reported thriving.

Car Shortage Closes Hammond Lumber Plant

The present car shortage presents a serious situation to the lumber mills in this district and more particularly the Hammond Lumber company which is the largest lumber manufacturing tributary to Albany. Unless some relief in the car situation is given immediately this large plant will be closed down and between 600 and 700 workmen thrown out of employment.
The report is given on good authority this mill is between 200 and 300 cars behind on delivery or orders, and the docks and warehouse of this company at Mill City are crowded with lumber ready for shipment. The company is not furnished 10 per cent of the number of cars required to handle their present orders and it is understood they have orders to the amount of several million feet sold at the present time.—Albany Democrat
