

NEW'S ATTORNEYS PREPARING FIGHT FOR HIS FREEDOM

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 9.—(United Press.)—With the murder trial of Harry S. New, a week off, forces to the battle to determine responsibility for the killing of pretty Frieda Lesser, his sweetheart, were being marshaled here today. Interest has been added to the case by the assertion of New that he is the son of United States Senator Harry S. New, of Indiana.

Dr. Charles Lewis Allen, noted alienist, is engaged in an exhaustive study of New's case, it was admitted at the district attorney's office. Allen examined New last week at the county jail, it was stated, but said he could not discuss his conclusions.

Other alienists are also known to have been engaged by both sides.

Not only will an attempt be made to prove New, himself, was temporarily insane the night he is alleged to have shot Miss Lesser when, as he said, she told him she would not become the mother of his child, but an attempt to prove hereditary insanity runs through his family will be made.

This will be done through testimony and depositions delving deeply into the family history, it is understood.

Attorneys estimate the trial will take at least two weeks. The district attorney plans to call seven major witnesses and the defense probably 20.

In addition the defense will introduce about 20 depositions, secured from persons residing in Indiana and New York.

COL. HOUSE DENIES REPORTS OF BREAK WITH PRESIDENT

New York, Dec. 9.—"I have read Mr. Siebold's article in the New York World and for obvious reasons I prefer to make no comment further than to say that my admiration and affection for the president are unchanged."

Colonel E. M. House declared in commenting on an article to the effect that he is no longer in favor with President Wilson.

The article, by Louis Siebold, recited incidents wherein it is claimed the colonel and the president were not in accord at the peace conference and expressed doubt that the president even knows House has returned to this country. It points out that House has not seen the president nor Secretary Lansing since he returned and is apparently no longer a factor in the peace negotiations. The article ascribes the belief that Colonel House and the president are estranged to "diplomats and politicians" and declares they expressed the belief that the reason is found in the authority House assumed and mistakes he made.

The next played by House in the selection of Paris as the seat of the peace conference, alleged action by the colonel which resulted in the sacrifice of the "freedom of seas" feature of the fourteen points and his dealings with Orlando in connection with the Fiume disputes, are cited as the principal points upon which House and the president broke.

HEARING ON COURT CONTEMPT CHARGE AGAIN POSTPONED

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 9.—Hearing on charges of contempt of court filed against leaders of the United Mine Workers of America were continued today until next Tuesday because of the prospective ending of the coal strike.

The federal grand jury investigation of information charging violation of the Lever act by mine operators and mine workers' postponed yesterday, was continued until December 17.

When the contempt cases were called in federal court, Judge C. B. Ames, assistant United States district attorney, asked Judge Anderson to continue the hearing because of the meeting of the defendants, scheduled for this afternoon.

The government confidently expects steps will be taken at this meeting which will fully and completely comply with the order of the court," he said.

"We believe complete mining operations will be resumed following the conference. In view of the facts which may develop the government desires continuance of the case for one week."

SEARCH FOR CHINESE BOY EXTENDED TODAY

The search which has been conducted in Salem's China town for two days for Sing Hai, wanted for an attempted assault on Ella Wolfe, 14, Sunday at Louie's Noodle house, Ferry and High streets, spread to Portland and surrounding towns in Marion and Polk counties today. Hai, who worked at Dallas, came to this city Sunday to spend the day. He is believed to be either in that town, or to have gone to Portland. Authorities in the metropolis have been notified to be on the lookout for him. Constable Walter DeLong was working all day yesterday and today gathering information and clues to aid in the hunt.

ROAD SIGN PLANS OF FEDERATION READY

As a result of a meeting last night in the Commercial club of the road sign committee of the Marion County Community Federation workable plans for completing the work of erecting signs at every important road intersection in the county were completed.

H. FORD'S CHANCE FOR SENATE SEAT REMOTE

Washington, Dec. 9.—Henry Ford's chances of being seated in the senate, even should Truman H. Newberry, now holding the place be convicted of the charges of fraud and corruption appear to be remote, according to clear opinion here today.

It was believed the approaching senate investigation will result in ordering a new election, in case irregularities are discovered.

Newberry's case is the first to come up since direct election of senators by popular vote began and the senate is somewhat confused in applying the precedents. The William Limer case, however, was cited as a parallel, the senate having voted to expel him after charges had been made that there was corruption in the Illinois legislature which elected him. A new election was ordered in that case.
