

MEXICAN REPLY TO SECOND U. S. NOTE LOOKED FOR TODAY

Washington, Dec. 8.—The state department expected to receive today the Mexican reply to the last American note calling for release from the political prisoner of Consul Agent A. J. Ham O. Jenkins.

Officials believe the trend of the reply will be that since Jenkins has been released on bail, there is no further cause for friction between the two governments. The United States does not agree with this view, they say.

Secretary Lansing is expected to make public a strong condemnation of Carranza's methods if this government's investigation confirms reports that Mexico arranged for Jenkins' bail so as to make it appear that Carranza won his contention that the consul agent could only be freed on payment of bail. But under these circumstances the Jenkins issue is not expected to be pushed further.

The last American note was withheld from publication in the Mexican press by order of Carranza, according to notices here, apparently because of Lansing's strong censure of the government in connection with the Jenkins case.

COUNTY ASSESSORS CANNOT ADMINISTER OATHS SAYS COURT

There is no law now upon the statute books of the state of Oregon authorizing the county assessor to administer an oath, according to an opinion written by Chief Justice McBride and handed down by the supreme court today. While the county assessor may require that a taxpayer prepare a sworn list of his taxable property it is contemplated that the oath be administered by a justice of the peace or some other official authorized to administer an oath, the opinion states. The opinion which is based upon the case of the state of Oregon, appellant, vs. George S. Craig affirms the verdict of Judge J. W. Knowles of Union county circuit court, who had found Craig not guilty on a charge of perjury for falsifying a list of his taxable property in Wallowa county in 1918.

Pasco Drug Clerk Killed In Explosion; Fire Follows

Pasco, Wn., Dec. 8.—Roy Van Ness, drug store clerk, is dead and six store buildings are in ruins today as the result of a fire which Pasco citizens fought for four hours in a blizzard last night.

An explosion of unknown origin started the blaze in the drug store. The flames spread to the Bank of Pasco and the post office. Three other buildings were gutted.

No estimates on the loss have been made as yet.

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—Fire that broke out between two hatches of the United States shipping board steamer Cockapunct at pier 28 today was finally extinguished at 9:30 a. m. after it had done considerable damage to the cargo. At the shipping board office it was said the fire, it was believed had not damaged the ship itself.

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT AMENDMENT IS FILED

A proposed amendment to the state constitution repealing the former amendment abolishing capital punishment and reinstating the death penalty for murder in the first degree was filed with the secretary of state's office here this morning by Mayor George L. Baker of Portland. The ballot title to the initiative measure must be prepared by the attorney general's office before the petition can be circulated for the signatures necessary to secure for it a place on the ballot at the next regular election.
