BATTLE IN PROGRESS NEAR BORDER, REPORT

Eagle Pass, Texas, Dec. 12.—Fighting was in progress at Palau, near Musquiz, it was reported here today following the arrival of Carranza reinforcements of five hundred on a special train. The result of the battle has not been learned. It is expected the Villistas were trying to get back to Chihuahua with the loot they got in their raid on Musquiz.

Five wealthy merchants and ranchmen of Musquiz, reported captured by the Villistas, are said to be held for \$10,000 ransom each, among them being Francisco Pardo, a Spaniard, and Francisco Mirand, ranchman. Communication with Musquiz has not yet been restored from Piedras Negras and train service has not been resumed. Communications are believed intact between Musquiz and Saltillo, but train operation is held up as a precautionary measure.

STOCKS TUMBLE IN WALL STREET RAID

New York, Dec. 12.—Following a weak opening and a steady decline throughout the morning and early afternoon, stocks were thrown into the market in tremendous volume around 2 o'clock, apparently regardless of price. This break accompanied a rise in call money to 15 per cent.

United States Steel was hammered to within three quarters of par. General Motors broke 12 to 11 1/2, Baldwin to 100 3/4, off 2; Bethlehem "B" to 89 1/4, off 2 1/8; Sinclair to 41 1/2, off 3 1/2; U. S. Rubber to 119 1/2, off 2 1/2; American Car and Foundry to 133, off 3 1/2; U. R. Stores to 87 1/2, off 2 1/2 and Tobacco Products to 85 1/8, off 3 7/8.

Call money eased off to 5 per cent in the last half hour and the whole market rallied. General Motors recovered from a low of 310 1/2 to 319 and U. S. Steel from 100 3/4 to 101 7/8. After touching 83 3/4, Tobacco Products advanced to 85 7/8 and International Paper moved from 71 to 73. St. Paul Preferred recovered to 60 7/8.

The market closed higher.
