Mail deliveries in the rural districts and in the city, excepting business houses that will be closed, will be made Christmas day as usual, according to Postmaster August Huckestein Wednesday. An effort will be made to have all Christmas parcels delivered during the day, and the conditions in the office back to normal by Friday. The stamp and general delivery windows in the post office will be open from eight to ten o'clock in the morning. Postmaster Huckestein said.

Sheriff William Orr of Polk county arrested Charles Gosso in Salem Tuesday. Gosso, who is about 20 years of age, was taken into custody during an investigation being made by Polk county authorities following the loss of \$600 worth of merchandise from two Dallas stores, Sunday night. The thieves who perpetrated the robbery, took goods valued at \$200 from the Golden Rule store while \$30 in cash and \$300 worth of photographic goods were taken from the Staffin drug store of the Polk county town.

Officers Branson and W. J. White, at 12:30 o'clock Friday morning, investigated a report that several shots had been fired in the vicinity of the high school, but found nothing. Much haste was made by the officers in reaching the scene of the shooting because of the several attempts made during the past week to burglarize homes here, and the officers thought some resident in that vicinity was holding a powder at bay. No one was found stirring, and Friday morning no further report of a commotion was received at headquarters.
