**Mount Clemens, Mich., Dec. 27.**—A story of clandestine trusts, told authorities by a Battle Creek girl, promised today to throw some light on the mystery surrounding the death of J. Stanley Brown, wealthy son of a former Detroit cigar manufacturer.

Brown's body, with several bullet holes in his neck and head, was found in his car on a lonely road near her Wednesday. While county officials were reticent, it was learned today that valuable evidence was procured during the questioning of the Battle Creek girl said to have been the sweetheart of one of Brown's closest friends.

It was reported Brown had visited his girl recently and she and her sweetheart had "split."

Authorities learned Brown was to have met the girl last Tuesday in Detroit, but failed to do so. She came here Wednesday in search of him and was held by the sheriff.

The girl's sweetheart was reported to have been seen riding in Brown's machine with Brown 12 hours before the latter was killed. Although he denied being with Brown after 9:30 Tuesday evening, Sheriff Caldwell said today the man had not furnished a satisfactory alibi. He has, however, not been arrested.

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 27.—Seven men are dead, several others reported dying and Frank Ross, a saloonkeeper, held by police here today following a Christmas celebration.

Washington, Dec. 27.—World food control and means of distribution are necessary to bolster Europe's morale and prevent spread of bolshevism; Major General Tasker H. Bliss, American military expert at the peace conference, says in an interview:

"European morale is tied up with the economic situation and that situation is bad." Bliss said. "They have had millions of producers killed or die from war injuries and injuries to many thousands of others have reduced the productive capacity."

"Europe as a whole is suffering greatly will continue to suffer from lack of food supplies."

Bliss declared that the greatest trouble is the lack of organization in Europe in distributing supplies.

"If Europe had a man like Herbert Hoover and a good railway executive to control all facilities for distribution the problem would very largely be solved. One of the great difficulties is that European rolling stock has been very badly handled. Everyone is trying to get a share of it. With new nations springing up all rolling stock is hoarded, as well as stock coming in, is being seized."

Bliss favors control of food and distribution in Europe for two years. He would include in the scheme Germany, Austria and possibly Russia, if the latter would agree to stop its efforts to spread bolshevist propaganda.

Washington, Dec. 27.—The sugar equalization board has requested President Wilson to withhold his signature from the McNary sugar bill until a paper explaining some features of it is filed with him, it was said today at the White House. The nature of the board's recommendation is not indicated, although it has the members' approval, it is said.

Chicago, Dec. 27.—John Somorowski, a district chief internal revenue agent here, was arrested by officials of the department of justice Friday charged with accepting bribes in connection with the enforcement of prohibition laws.

The specific charge against Somorowski was that he accepted \$250 from a saloonkeeper in return for allowing him to sell liquor.

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
