YOUTH PASSES BAD CHECK IN PAYMENT FOR CAR; IS CAUGHT

Victor P. Franklin, of Brownsville is being held at the county jail here on a forgery charge, having given Lee L. Gilbert of Salem a check for \$1465 in purchasing an Elgin car Saturday. Franklin, who claims that he is 17 years of age, is said to have registered at the Capital Hotel, December 22, giving the name of William Gagg, Franklin's alleged forgery career seems to have started from this point. The car is being held at Corvallis.

In purchasing an Elgin car from Gilbert, who conducts the Elgin agency in Salem, Franklin is said to have represented himself as W. R. Eggleston, of Brownsville, and claimed that he was over 21 years of age. Before closing the deal, Gilbert communicated with the Brownsville bank, receiving the assurance that Eggleston was good for the check. The deal was then closed and the young man drove away with the car.

The Elgin dealer's suspicions were aroused Friday by a "confirmation of sale" telegram from a Corvallis dealer to whom Franklin is reported to have attempted to sell the car, claiming that "it would not run." Mr. Gilbert immediately sent warning that there was "something wrong" with the entire deal, and not waiting for the check's return through regular channels, took immediate steps to locate Eggleston in Brownsville, soon learning that the Salem visitor was an impostor.

Franklin was returned from Corvallis Saturday by Constable Walter De Long, and was arraigned before Judge Unruh Monday afternoon. Franklin, who says that he is in the tenth grade of the Brownsville schools, claims that he was led into the trouble by a man named South, who has not been located.

Gilbert says that he will prosecute to the full extent of the law.

BODIES OF VICTIMS OF WRECK RECOVERED

St. Johns, N. F., Dec. 29.—The bodies of several members of the crew of the Dutch steamer Anton Van Driel were washed ashore near the eastern head of St. Johns today.

The vessel struck the rocky coast last night. Five men still were clinging to the superstructure today, but the sea was too rough to effect their rescue.

It was not known here how many men were drowned.

Part of the crew took the boats, it was reported, but these were swamped.

Great seas were breaking over the ship today.

A steamer was to be sent from St. Johns to effect rescue of the men still on the ship.
