



Chicago, Jan. 1.—Statistics compiled Railway Age show that the year year begins with the development of the railways of the United States nearer a complete standstill than that at any Uine since the first rail was laid in America. "In the year 1919," says the Rail-way Age, "the total mileage of new lines built in the United States was lines built in the United States was fishe miles, the smallest figure ever re-corded by this paper. Furthermore it does not represent a net increase m mileage. During the year 685 miles of mileage. During the year 689 miles of main line railway were abandoned for operation. Prior to the year 1915 the mileage of the country was steadily mileage of the country was steadily increasing, although the rate at waren it was increasing had been diminishing for some years and especially since 1910."
