PROPER EMERGENCY LEGISLATION.

WE WOULD respectfully call the attention of the Governor and legislature to the necessity of a law compelling proper labeling of products produced in Oregon.

This law is made necessary by the fact that Oregon products are being misbranded as California and Washington products, to which they are superior, and Oregon is losing the advertising and reputation that her more progressive sister states are stealing.

Oregon prunes are advertised and sold as "California Product" and as "California Glace Prunes." Oregon cherries are sold as "California Glace Fruit" and as "California Royal Anne Cherries."

Every day this situation exists works injury to the name and fame of Oregon—therefore it is proper to consider it as emergency legislation and act upon it at the special session.

Senator Lachmund made a hard fight for a similar measure at the last session, but its importance was not generally recognized, and it was log rolled to emasculation through the influence of Portland jobbers, and cannery and commission men whose greed for the dollar outweighs state loyalty.

No one ever saw the time when more money was not the crying need of both of these institutions—and doubtless the time will never come when they do not ask money. 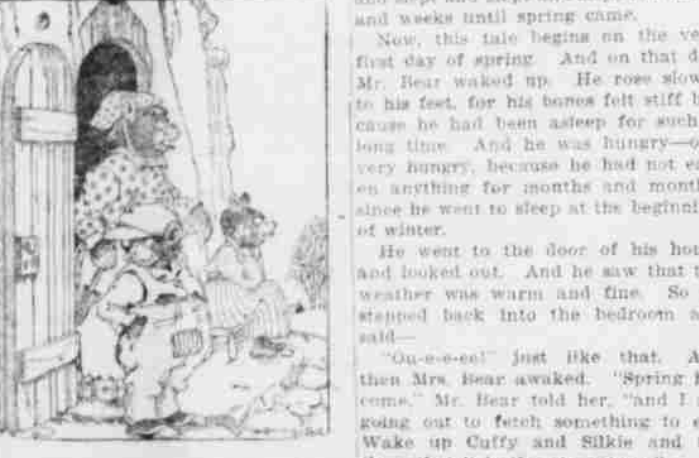
