

### CONGRESS ASKS FOR MILLION TO DEAL WITH REDS

Washington, Jan. 6.—Congress was asked today by the labor department for a fund of \$1,000,000 for the enforcement of laws against alien radicals and \$100,000 for their deportation.

New York, Jan. 6.—More than 20,000 alien enemies in the Communist party of New York state alone are openly organized for violent overthrow of the government under the direction of bolshevik leaders in Russia, Senator Clayton R. Luck, chairman of the legislative committee investigating subversive activities declared today.

"The arrests already made in the state on the charge of criminal anarchy and for deportation hardly scratch the surface of the situation," said the senator.

### COMPROMISE PLAN ON GAME BUREAU FAVORED BY OLCOTT

As a compromise move in an attempt to reach an amicable settlement of the fish and game commission controversy the proposed commission of seven members, three to have jurisdiction over the commercial interests, three to represent the interests of the sportsmen of the state and the seventh member to be a neutral who would act as an arbiter in the event of a dispute between the two departments, will be entirely acceptable to Governor Olcott. In a statement issued Tuesday the governor declares that in his opinion the proposed plan "would not lead to the same harmonious and beneficial results that might be expected from two entirely separate commissions, such as had been suggested by the executive in a former statement to the press, but that as a compromise he deemed it a step in the right direction and as such acceptable and agreeable."

Governor Olcott denies reports to the effect that the conference was a stormy one, and seeks to correct this impression in a formal statement issued Tuesday morning which follows: "Apparently there has been a misunderstanding as to the results of the meeting of the fisheries and game commission at the capital yesterday."

"Following discussion among members of the committee and representatives of various interests in the senate chamber, legislators of the committee came into my office and presented the following:

"Would it be acceptable to the executive if a bill were passed providing for a commission of seven members, three of these to have exclusive control over the commercial interests and three over the sportsmen's interests—the seventh member to act as an arbiter in case of disputes?"

### VON BRINCKEN TO FIGHT ATTEMPTS AT DEPORTATION

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—Every effort will be made to prevent the deportation to Germany of Wilhelm von Brincken, former attaché of the German consulate general in this city, when he is released Friday from the federal prison at McNeil's island, attorneys for Von Brincken said here today. The former German attaché was convicted in 1917 of conspiracy to violate the neutrality law.

A warrant issued in October, 1918, charging violation of the immigration act, will be served on Von Brincken when he is released, his attorneys stated, but to offset this they have filed a brief in behalf of the conspirator. Should the federal immigration authorities try to send him to Germany, a long legal fight will follow, the attorneys said. They already have filed a bond of \$1,000 to secure Von Brincken's release when the immigration warrant is served on him.

### ADVANCE IN SHOE PRICE PREDICTED

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 6.—Today before the annual convention of the National Shoe Travelers association, J. B. Byrne, of Rochester, N. Y., the president of the association, predicted a fifty percent advance in the price of shoes next summer.

Portland, Or., Jan. 6.—State School Superintendent Churchill has sent an appeal to the Portland chamber of commerce to lend its assistance in filling 140 vacancies in rural schools of the state. The vacancies are the result of low salaries, it is said.

San Francisco, Jan. 6.—The case of Floyd Leo McClure, 29 year old youth charged with the murder of Police Officer Anton Schuonke of the San Francisco police department, went to the jury at 10 o'clock today.

### Mother Of Murdered Girl Takes Stand Against New

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 6.—The black-eyed figure of Mrs. Alice Lester, supported on crutches, made its halting progress to the witness stand here today at the trial of Harry S. New, Mrs. Lester was the mother of Freda Lester, for whose death last July the defendant is now on trial.

### Only Two Houses Standing Quake In Coutzlan Leaves

Mexico City, Jan. 6.—Only two houses are left standing in the village of Coutzlan, state of Vera Cruz, where no estimate has yet been placed on the number of dead and injured resulting from Saturday's night earthquake, according to reports today. 11 bodies have been recovered from the river at San Francisco De La Pena, Vera Cruz, in addition to twenty-four at Racondia.

Twelve soldiers were among those buried under the ruins of the church at Coscomatepec, shaken down by the earth disturbances.

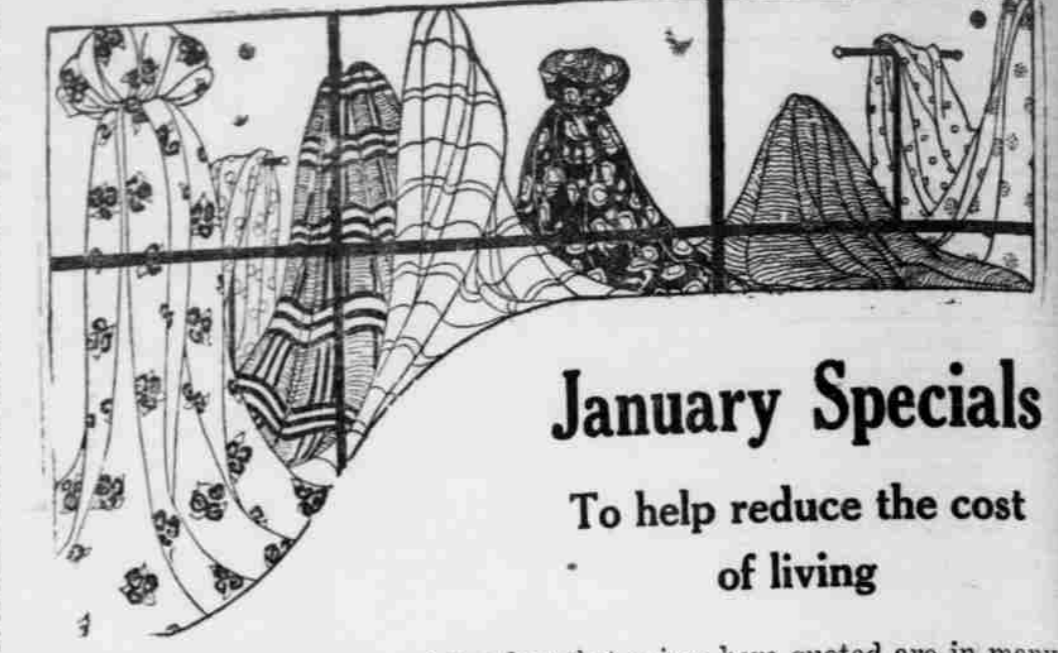
