PROSPECTS OF FAST BALL CLUB IN CITY THIS SUMMER GOOD

Promises of a fast baseball team for Salem during the coming season and the prospect of seeing some of the fastest semi-professional clubs in the northwest perform on the local grounds, were announced today by Biddle Bishop, who is leading in the movement to re-establish the national pastime in the city.

Bishop, who was formerly with the Butte and Tacoma northwestern league clubs and at one time with the old McMinnville "Yelobans," is now located in Salem with the Willamette Valley Transfer company. He is enthusiastic over the material of which Salem boasts in the way of local talent, among whom are Cole Cox, Miller, Proctor, Adams, Keen, Humphreys and Craig, Knickerbocker, of the old McMinnville club, is also available, being employed at present at the state house.

To strengthen such an aggregation it is expected that Wayne Barham, who was with Portland last year, Jack Hayes of the Idaho State league, and Duckey Holmes, a promising Portland boy, will be here before the opening of the season. All have expressed their intentions of locating in Salem.

It is announced that games will be arranged with all of the fast teams of the Willamette valley and other parts of Oregon, and that an effort will be made to bring fast Tacoma and Seattle semi-pro teams here at intervals during the summer.
