

CHERRIANS AND GUESTS FROLIC INTO LATE HOUR

Salem Cherrians and 160 of their guests were entertained by talented Portland artists Tuesday night at the most pretentious dinner dance yet given by the booster aggregation. Young community clubs from Oregon and Washington cities were present at the high rites presided over by King Bing Clancy. Table and dance schedule plans included 50 Prunarians from Vancouver, Wash., 56 Radiators from Eugene and 34 Portland Rosarians.

During the past week talksmen had been signalled to big chiefs of the near-by tribes and early Tuesday the high sachems from various medicine councils began to assemble in the city of the Heap Big Cherry. The gray war paint of the Prunarians, the full war regalia of the Rosarians, Cherrians in red and white and the dapper gray and red uniforms of the Eugene Radiators added to the kindred harmony of the social good-feeling evident during the course of the post-lunch.

Banquet Elaborate Affair.
The banquet may well be regarded as the most successful as well as the most elaborate of Salem's social affairs during the season.

Beginning at 7 p. m. the program was opened by C. B. Clancy, who as "King Bing" extended a cordial welcome to the visitors and assured them that the banquet symbolized Salem's good-will toward her neighbors and of a desire to perpetuate community union in working for the progress of the state.

J. W. Shaw "Big Prune" of the Astoria Prunarians led the visitors in reciprocal remarks, by no means detracting from his expression of good-fellowship when he asserted that he was "full of prunes." "Big Prune" Shaw was followed by E. G. Urane of Eugene, who as president of the Radiators emphasized the need of community cooperation. C. F. Smith, Prime Minister of the Portland Rosarians also joined in pleading his organization for the advancement of community reciprocity with the ultimate advancement of Oregon as the impelling motive. Charles Vick, who as a loyal Cherrian always makes it a point to attend Cherrian affairs regardless of intervening distance was applauded by the assembly following a short talk in which he counseled perseverance and consistent effort in all community projects.

Program Enjoyable.
The musical program arranged by Madame Lillian Jeffreys Petri was worthy of the tremendous ovations excited during its rendition. The Cherrians as host and also their guests were unable as to quality to discriminate between any of the numbers and each performer was encored repeatedly until the passing time curtailed further response.

The artists of the evening were: Mrs. Dudley Clark, coloratura soprano; Miss Marie Gammie, danceuse; Mde. Lillian Jeffreys Petri, pianist; William Wallace Graham, violinist; Christian Roubelle, cellist.

The dinner itself deserved favorable comment, the menu, arrangement, service, receiving high praise from the visitors. The culinary and service staffs of the Hotel Marston were congratulated for the superior quality and faultless execution of the dinner program.

The dance for which music was furnished by Steinhilber's orchestra, continued to a late hour, the guests seemingly being loath to depart.

BOOZE SALE PLAN IS OPPOSED; MUCH WINE SEIZED IN 'FRISCO

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—Two big wine seizures today followed the announcement yesterday that the internal revenue department would permit the disposal of wine under an option plan evolved by Theodore A. Bell, attorney for various liquor interests. One seizure resulted in the seizure of thousands of gallons in the cellars of a local liquor establishment and the other in the confiscation of a \$20,000 wine shipment to Wood, Stokely county.

An interpretation of the option plan whereby the person disposing of the wine can not secure it from another but must rely on stocks purchased by himself before war time prohibition became effective, was announced by the collector of internal revenue today. It was held by the collector that in both of the seizures mentioned the wine had been purchased from a third party for delivery to the ultimate consignee.

Arrests For Drunkenness In Portland Show Big Increase

Portland, Or., Jan. 7.—Notwithstanding the fact that the day of the saloon in Portland's four years removed and national prohibition took effect July 1, last year, there were more arrests here for drunkenness during the year just ended than in either 1918 or 1917, according to the annual report of the chief of police just made public.

The figures for this offense, the report shows, were 1268 for last year, 1364 for 1918, and 1212 in 1917.

CREWS CLAIMS DENIED

Portland, Or., Jan. 7.—Claims of members of the crew of the steamer West Hartland for additional compensation on the ground that they did not receive proper food on the vessel's return voyage from the Orient in Portland have been denied by Harry Montgomery, United States shipping commissioner for Portland, following a thorough investigation of the case.

CHAMPIONSHIP SCRAP ASSURED TO AMERICA

Paris, Jan. 7.—Georges Carpentier and Jack Dempsey probably will meet in America for the championship of the world as a result of the acceptance last night by Descamps, manager for Carpentier, of an offer of \$146,000 purse for the bout by James Coffroth. Dempsey has already accepted Coffroth's terms and all that remains to ensure the meeting is settlement of the number of rounds the men will fight and division of the purse.

Coffroth's offer was for a bout going 45 rounds but objection to a fight of this length is expressed in Carpentier camp. Carpentier would rather have the fight limited to fifteen rounds or even ten. Descamps declared last night that if the issue is not settled in less than 15 rounds "neither Dempsey or Carpentier is worthy to be champion of the world."

It was indicated Descamps would ask for an even break of the purse, holding Carpentier was as great a drawing card as Dempsey.

HOME PRODUCTS WEEK PLANS BEING SHAPED

Plans for staging the Home Products week in Salem, between January 13 and 24, will be formed by committee of the Business Men's League and the Commercial Club who were scheduled to meet Wednesday afternoon at the club chambers. Decision to hold the Home Products Week here was reached Monday at the luncheon of the business men at the Commercial Club, A. G. Clark, manager of the Associate Industries of Oregon, spoke on the subject.

The committee of business men selected to evolve plans for the thrift week campaign in Salem, which comes during the Home Products week, will meet at five o'clock in the club.

James Colestock, Sawmill Man, Dies Of Pneumonia

James Colestock, 43, an employe of the Chas. K. Spaulding Logging company died at a local hospital late Tuesday night, a victim of pneumonia. Mr. Colestock's feet were frozen during the recent cold weather and he was taken to the hospital for treatment. Pneumonia later developed, resulting in his death.

A sister, Mrs. Alice Summers of Venice, Cal., his only known relative, was notified Wednesday of his death. The funeral will not be set until word is received from her. The body is at the parlors of the Webb & Clough company.

"DEATH CAR" DRIVER FREED

Portland, Or., Jan. 7.—Joe Minkin, blacksmith, whose automobile ran down and killed seven-year-old Yvonne Cummings on November 17, was found not guilty of involuntary manslaughter by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Tucker last night. The trial occupied almost two days.

SOVIET PAPER IS RAIDED FOR REDS

New York, Jan. 7.—Another raid was made late today by department of justice agents on the offices of the Russian soviet newspaper *Novy Mir*. Fourteen men and one woman, who were attending a meeting of the Communist Labor party were arrested. The agents also found cards on which were the names of 1,000 communists throughout the United States.

New York, Jan. 7.—An order for commitment to jail of Dr. Michael Miesig, treasurer of the Russian radical paper *Novy Mir*, on which Trotsky worked before going to soviet Russia to become minister of war, was prepared today by Deputy Attorney General Herger. By supreme court Justice Davis' decision last night that Miesig was in contempt of the joint legislative committee investigating sedition activities when he refused to answer certain questions, the sheriff of New York county will be empowered to put Miesig in jail and keep him there until he decides to make reply to any and all inquiries the committee may make of him.

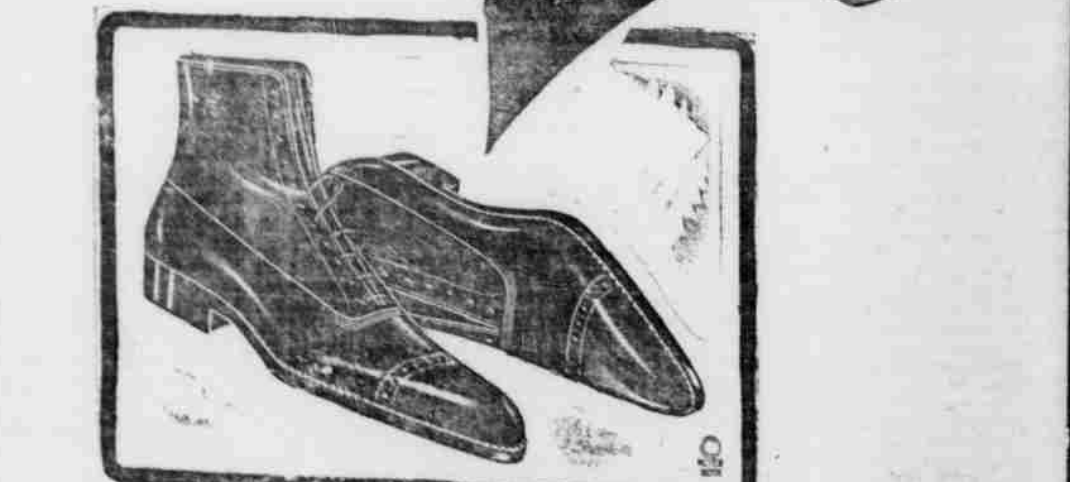
