

### AGGIE LOOP ARTISTS HARD AT WORK AND SHOWING PROMISE

Oregon Agricultural College, Jan. 8.—With the opening of the second quarter Monday the varsity basketball men started actual work for their first season of 21 games. Although pre-season work was begun shortly after the football season closed the work to date has been more for conditioning the men and getting the coaches acquainted with the work of each individual and no emphasis has been placed on teamwork or preparing for the games.

With the first game set for early next week, the men from whom the team will be picked will go through two hours of hard workout each day. The coaches have seen enough of the men to judge the work of each and have about 20 men from whom to pick the team.

Something over 30 have been out to date. Most of the teamwork will be built up this week in order to make a good start against the Multnomah Athletic club here Saturday night. Two forwards who make a classy combination are Gurley and Slinson. The former is the most experienced man out for the forward job and the fact that he played on Hod Ray's undefeated team of two seasons ago makes him one of the most likely looking prospects. The latter is eligible for his first year of varsity work this season and shows much promise.

Two other forwards who are strong contenders for jobs are Arthur and Hickman of the conference team of last season. Arthur was a regular last year and is working hard to hold his old job while Hickman, a substitute last season, is making a strong bid for a regular position this year. "Spec" Keene is furnishing Eklie, man, of last year's team, with some good competition with his cleverness in the middle of the floor and has the ability to make a conference man. Otto Herman, center on the rook team last year, is working well at center. McCarty, who played part time as center and part time as forward on the varsity last year, is also putting in a big bid for the jumping job this year.

Captain "Butts" Beardon and "Cac" Hubbard will hold down the guard position. "Butts" has had more experience on the basketball floor than any man out and his work on the undefeated quintet of two seasons ago gives him a big start toward a regular job. "Cac" was a substitute on the same team and is putting up a strong fight for a regular position.

Reynolds and Ellerton, both members of the team last year are out after their places. Reynolds played regular last year and Ellerton was used considerably at guard. Gill and Clough are two more guards who work well together. Gill played on the Freshman team in 1918 and has been a service since while Clough was a regular on the rook team last year.

"Oregon used good judgment in relying on dropkicks to score, as Harvard was strong on defense inside the 20-yard line. If they made any mistake, it was in letting Mansrud and Steers alternate in kicking. If one man had done all the kicking, he might have become steadier and put one over. Neither man had any too much time to get away his kicks, as Desmond and the other Harvard linemen were breaking through on each attempt." Wapato gave his opinion that Casey, Harvard's All-American back, was no better than Steers.

Coch Mathews' basketball squad left for Dallas shortly after noon today for a practice game with the Dallas American Legion team tonight. The entire squad of fourteen men made the trip. ### U. S. TO ENTER RUGBY TEAMS AT ANTWERP

New York, Jan. 8.—That the United States will be represented at the Antwerp Olympic games next summer in certain branches of sport not heretofore participated in appears probable in view of early activity shown in this direction. One of the latest proposals involves the entry of an American Rugby football team in the Olympic competition which, according to unofficial dates is scheduled to be played during the closing weeks of August.

According to Pacific coast advices the material and partial financial backing for such entry is available from among the players of the Universities of California and Stanford. It is understood that Stanford university athletes enthusiastically have expressed a willingness to help finance such a team.

It is pointed out that during the Christmas holidays a combined Stanford and California Rugby team defeated British Columbia, defeating two all star Canadian teams 2 to 0. University of British Columbia 5 to 0, and All-Star Victoria combination 15 to 4.

### BASEBALL

Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 8.—Refusal of the fellow members of the national baseball commission to accept the resignation of August Herrmann as chairman means that those opposing him have another month in which to decide upon a suitable man for the position. The commission as it present constituted will get together for a last time in Chicago on February 11, after which date Mr. Herrmann gave notice yesterday that he would refuse to serve.

The opposition to Mr. Herrmann as chairman is said to consist principally of five National League club owners.

### HIGH COSTS HIT HARD AT ORPHAN ASYLUMS

Portland, Or., Jan. 8.—The high cost of living has hit Oregon orphanages a body blow, according to Father E. V. O'Hara, who addressed Reed college students in the chapel Thursday.

"Before the war it cost \$12 per month in an Oregon home," he said. "Now the cost is between \$25 and \$30 and constantly rising. For this reason, the orphanages of Oregon have formed an association to take care of their finances. It is no longer desirable for each home to take care of its budget by separate drives and tag sales; the interests of all the orphans of Oregon must be cared for by one agency. "Oregonians should understand that the state is not giving funds to help the orphanages as such; it is merely taking care of its orphan wards who happen to be in private instead of state institutions."

#### SUFFRAGE APPROVED

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 8.—Governor Harlow yesterday signed the resolution approving the national suffrage amendment which has passed both houses of the general assembly.
