

HOUSE FAVORS BILL TO INCREASE PAY IN ALL NAVY BRANCHES

Washington, Jan. 12.—By a big majority, the house military affairs committee Monday agreed to report favorably the bill of Representative Crago, republican, Pennsylvania, granting an increase of 20 per cent in the pay of all officers of the army, navy, marine corps, public health service and coast guard up to and including the rank of brigadier general in the army and equivalent grades in other services. The bill also would increase the pay of the enlisted personnel of these services twenty per cent in all cases where the present base pay amounts to \$33 a month or more.

Increases provided in the bill would be effective from passage until June 30, 1921, and it is estimated would cost the government approximately \$10,000,000 annually.

The house naval affairs committee has agreed to increase in the pay of officers and men of the navy, an effort will be made to obtain consent of the naval committee to substitution of the Crago bill. If this permission cannot be obtained, Representative Crago said the portion of his bill applying to the navy probably will be stricken. The bill is to be reported to the house today.

Three companion bills, having for their purpose an increase of approximately 30 per cent in payments to injured workers entitled to benefits under the workmen's compensation act, establishment of a fund to be used by the accident commission for the vocational rehabilitation of injured workers and the return to the industrial accident fund of \$400,000 which was set aside by an act of the last legislature for a reconstruction hospital, were introduced in the house Monday by the committee on labor and industry.

Senator Norblad today introduced a bill to give the port of Astoria authority to levy an additional \$100,000 in taxes to purchase the naval base site. The bill likewise provides that the port of Astoria be allowed to issue \$2,000,000 in bonds to deepen the harbor, construct belt railroad lines, piers and other improvements.

Hopes of a large number of stenographers of receiving employment during the special session were blasted when Representative Bean of Lane county put through an amendment in the house exempting the long standing rule of allowing each law maker a stenographer or clerk.

An amendment to the present tax laws of the state giving the county assessors and their deputies authority to administer oaths was introduced in the house at the instigation of the Oregon county assessors' association. It is contended by many of the assessors that the present law intended to cover the administering of oaths, but that they were deprived of this power through a recent decision of the supreme court.

Prohibiting further increases in the cost of living by declaring illegal profiteering trusts, monopolies and conspiracies in restraint of trade and competition is a bill introduced in the house by Representative Lewis of Multnomah county.

SCHOOL FOR SCANDAL PLAYS HERE THURSDAY

An "The School for Scandal" is to be given at the Grand Opera House on Thursday, January 15 by the Devreux company, an outline of its curious history will be acceptable by those who contemplate seeing it when shown here.

"The School for Scandal" was produced at Drury Lane Theatre on May 8, 1777. On the night before its first production the play-wright-manager, Richard Brinsley Sheridan, was informed that the necessary license had been refused, on the ground that "Moses, the Jew" was believed to be a satire on Hopkins Wilkes, opponent in the contest for the office of City Chamberlain. Sheridan, however, got over the difficulty after an interview with Lord Hertford, the Lord Chamberlain. The play was at once a brilliant success. It ran for twenty nights until the end of the season and was acted sixty times the following season. Afterwards, for some years, it was acted regularly three nights a week, and it has retained its popularity for over a century. Sheridan never published an authorized edition of the play, and when urged to revise it for the press, said that he had been nineteen years endeavoring to satisfy himself with the style of the piece, and had not succeeded. The play was, however, printed at Dublin from a copy which Sheridan sent to his sister for disposal to her own advantage, but the early editions contain many variations. It is claimed by many authorities that there is in existence two acts of the play with corrections by Sheridan, presumably with a view to publication.

SHOE PRICES STILL ON UP-GRADE REPORT

Boston, Mass., Jan. 12.—"Have shoe prices reached the limit?" A committee of the Boston Retail Shoe Dealers' association, after canvassing the situation, says "no." The question and answer are contained in a report given out Monday in connection with the annual convention of the national shoe retailers' association in session here.

Explaining why higher prices are to be expected the report says:

"Shoes now on sale were made from leather costing sixty cents to one dollar a foot. Prices now being made for spring are from material costing eighty cents to \$1.25 a foot, plus higher costs for other materials and additional grams to labor, with less sale per man produced."

Prices will go down, it said, "when there is more leather and less demand for it," and "when strikes cease and labor connected with shoes buckles down and produces more."

Shoe dealers advise people to shun their own shoes. Aside from the saving, the report said, "it is important to know that the heat or friction burning of the savage onslaught of the professional shoe shiner is responsible for most of the upper cracking."
