

SUBSTITUTE BILL RESTORING DEATH PENALTY IS PASSED

While Senator Smith of Josephine and Senator Stricker of Clatsop Wednesday afternoon adopted the substitute bill presented by the Judiciary committee providing for the restoration of the death penalty in Oregon for the crime of treason and murder in the first degree with a provision whereby the trial jury in presenting its verdict may recommend life imprisonment instead of hanging.

The bill takes the place of one introduced Monday and sponsored by 26 of the 29 members of the senate, which provided for the restoration of the death penalty with no alternative upon conviction of treason or first degree murder. The resolution involves a constitutional amendment and must go to a vote of the people next May if passed by the house.

Houston Is Opposed.

Senator Houston in opposing the substitute bill declared that it would serve only to destroy the purpose of capital punishment which was primarily to "put the fear of God" into the heart of the would-be criminal.

"Under this bill no one will ever be hanged in Oregon except, perhaps, in times of great stress," declared Houston, who insisted that the fact would soon become known to the criminal class and take away any fear of hanging that might otherwise be instilled into them.

Senator Banks declared that he was not so blood-thirsty as some of his colleagues. "I believe," he stated, "that life imprisonment is greater punishment than the death penalty." The governor, he insisted, should be stripped of his power to pardon convicts sentenced to life imprisonment who should be compelled to serve out their sentence without hope of executive clemency.

"We are going at this problem backward," Banks insisted. "I would rather deal with ten thousand guilty men who escape than that one innocent man should be put to death."

Death 'Not Deterrent.'

"Statistics," he continued, "show that murders are greater proportionately in states which have capital punishment than those which do not. He pointed to the Centralia armistice day murders in Washington, a state which has a provision for the death penalty to prove that the prospect of the gallows will not deter a murderer from committing crime. The people of the state, he concluded, would defeat the measure as originally introduced if it ever came up for their action at the polls.

Sentiment was strong throughout the state for capital punishment, he admitted, but the people of the state were not so blood-thirsty as to deprive the trial jury from recommending leniency should the circumstances, as developed at the trial, be such as to justify such a recommendation."

Senator Handley declared that he had been consistently opposed to capital punishment but that if it should be restored in Oregon he wanted it without any complicating provisions which would permit the jury virtually to pass the sentence in rendering its verdict. It was just as easy for a jury to find a man guilty of second degree murder and subject to life imprisonment, he insisted, as it would be to find him guilty of first degree murder and recommend a sentence of life imprisonment. The substitute measure, he declared, was merely a camouflaged move in an attempt to attract votes.

KODAKS AND JEWELRY RAIDS AT MT. ANGEL

Stores and business houses of Mt. Angel were raided Wednesday night when burglars made away with quantities of Kodaks, cash and jewelry the value of which has not been ascertained but is placed about \$250. The looting of the Good drug store, the Mount Angel Creamery and the Leo Barr jewelry store, was reported to Sheriff Needham early Thursday morning and Deputy Sheriff Bower hurried to Mount Angel at once.

The robbery was reported by Fred Schwab of Mount Angel, an attempt to enter the Schwab warehouse offices having also been made.

The Mount Angel raid is supposed to have been staged by the same operators who made Kodak and jewelry hauls at Dallas and Sheridan. Business men of Sheridan have posted an offer of \$1000 for the arrest and conviction of the men who robbed the Haas drug store and the Hixler jewelry stores at Sheridan, January 11.
