constitutional amendment to prohibit the secretary of state from succeeding to the office of governor in the event of the death or inability of the chief executive to act, was introduced into the senate Friday afternoon by Senator Banks.

Under the terms of the resolution in case of the death or disability of the governor, the secretary of state would simply assume and execute the duties of the governor's office un-til the next general election, when a

governor would be elected.

The amendment will have to be subnyited to the people for approval if it is passed by the legislature.

The resolution is prompted by the recent controversy over the right of Ben W. Olcott to fill the office of governor for the full unexpired term of the late Governor Withycombe and which was decided in favor of Olcott by a supreme court decision handed

tion, absence from the state or in-ability to discharge the duties of the office, the secretary of state shall act as governor until the disability be removed, or until the vacancy is filled at the next general biennial election. and in the case of removal from of-fice, death, resignation, absence from the state or inability both of the governor and secretary of state, the pres ident of the senate shall act as gov-ernor until the disability be removed, or a governor be elected at the next general biennial election. The govrnor elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office for the unexpired term of Visions of the Banks measure.
