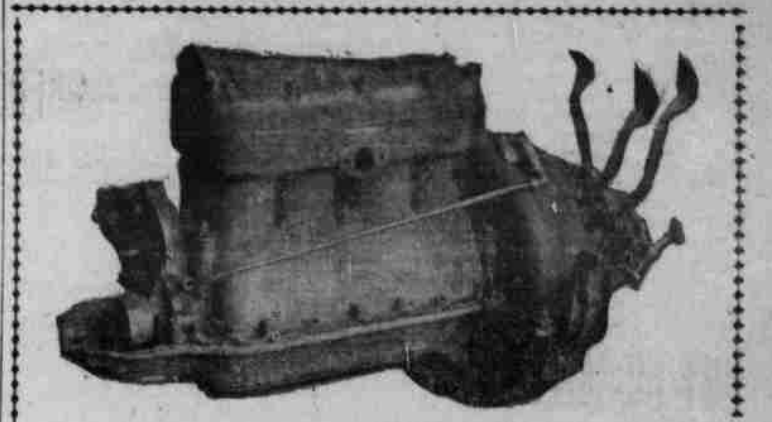

Senator Thomas followed the senate from Coos county onto the floor with a bill designating a road in Jackson county and he was followed in turn by Senator Eddy, who had a bill for a road in Douglas county, and by Senator Patterson, who advocated the designation of a road in Polk county.
