

### SPECIAL SESSION OF LEGISLATURE COST STATE NEAR \$17,000

The legislative org in which the law makers of the state engaged last week will cost the tax payers of Oregon at least \$17,000 in direct expenses. Incident to the session and this item may reach \$20,000 before all the expenses are finally rounded up. Mileage and per diem of the legislators aggregate \$5557.40 during the week adding another \$2788 to the expense account. Printing bills, and calendars for a cost of \$1000 while the printing and binding of the laws enacted by the session and the journals of the session will cost another \$3000. Supplies for the session cost approximately \$400. These items, together with the extra janitor service and numerous other expenses incident to the assembling of the solons have already reached a grand total of \$15,500. Investigations instituted by the session and which will be charged as part of the expense of the session, are expected to bring the cost of operating the legislative mill for the six days and night close to the \$20,000 mark. Additional appropriations approved by the session and already filed with the secretary of state's office amount to \$479,458.85 with still other bills involving appropriations awaiting action by the governor.

### Women Urged to Forget Idea of Lure of Dress

New York, Jan. 20.—Women were urged to lower the cost of colthies by abandoning the world-old tradition that they must dress to capture the fleeting fancy of the male or to outdo others of their sex, in an address today by Helen Louise Johnson, editor of the General Federation Magazine, before the Columbia University Institute of Arts and Sciences. Lower prices could be brought about, she added in her talk on "The Ethics of Dress," by the adoption of a standardized costume.

"Man," Miss Johnson said, "can dress properly and becomingly on a limited number of suits. His reasoning seems to be that beauty unadorned is adorned the most. His clothes are far from beautiful."

Women would become less conspicuous and more impressive by wearing standard dress, she declared, for "the active, healthy woman creates a spirit of impression by simplifying her dress, and thus enhancing her facial beauty, while her less advanced sister clings to the older dress forms."

### WILLAMETTE GLEE TO TOUR SOUTHERN AND EASTERN OREGON

The Willamette university glee club will leave next Thursday morning, January 23, for a two weeks tour of eastern Oregon and southern Washington. They will give a concert at Goldendale, Wash., the 23rd, at Wasco, Ore., the 30th, and at Arlington the 31st. They will sing Feb. 2 at Hermiston, at Pendleton the 3d, and at Athena the 4th. After a concert at Milton, Feb. 5, they will give a matinee at Pasco, Wash., and sing at Kennewick the evening of the 6th. Performances will be given at Sunnyside February 7, at Yakima the 9th, and at Ellensburg the 10th. It is possible that they will sing in Seattle and Bremerton later.

The glee club is directed by Dr. John R. Sites, dean of the school of music. Most of the members are experienced, a number having returned from service, besides those who were in the club last year. New members are Ross Miles, baritone; Ben Rickle, second tenor, and Vernon Sackett, bass.

The returned service men are Loren Basler, baritone; Everett Craven and Fred McGrew, basses, and Herald Emmel, first tenor. Miss Evelyn DeLong is acting as accompanist.

The program consists of numbers by the glee club, a piano solo by Miss DeLong, special solos by Floyd McIntire and Vernon Sackett, a cornet solo by Loren Basler, and selections by the varsity male quartet, Francis Cramer, McIntire, Edwin Sociofaky and Fred McGrew. Emmel and Craven stage a vaudeville stunt which keeps the audience in a roar of laughter for several minutes, the program lasts two hours, and is always declared too short.

### WAR OVER TEXAS OIL LANDS IS FORESEEN

Austin, Texas, Jan. 20.—Serious threats by claimants of oil lands in dispute between Texas and Oklahoma that they will take the law in their own hands, present possibilities of fighting along the Texas-Oklahoma boundary, said W. A. Keeling, assistant attorney general, today and rangers have been sent to the region to prevent this threatening disorder.

Both Texas and Oklahoma claimants threaten to shoot anyone who interferes with their occupation of the property, he claimed.

### SUPREME COURT PUTS END TO SEVEN SUITS

The following opinions were handed down by the supreme court this morning:

Robert N. Parks et al vs Wm. R. Smith et al, appellants, appeal from Lane county; suit to foreclose mortgage. Opinion by Justice Bean. Decree of Judge G. F. Skipworth modified by elimination of attorney's fees.

Andy Erickson vs City of Marshfield et al, appellants; appeal from Coos county; suit to recover money retained by city as bail; opinion by Justice Johns. Judge John S. Coke affirmed.

Montezano Lumber and Manufacturing company, appellant, vs Portland Iron works; appeal from Multnomah county; action for the conversion of personal property; appeal from judgment of non-suit; opinion by Justice Bean; Judge W. N. Gatens affirmed.

Robert Looney et al vs James K. Sears et al, appellants; appeal from Gilliam county; petition for rehearing denied in opinion by Justice Burnett.

George Gardner vs City of Portland et al, appellants; appeal from Multnomah county; suit in equity seeking cancellation of assessment levied upon property to aid in payment of paving Holgate street. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge W. N. Gatens reversed and case dismissed.

Ukase Investment company et al vs City of Portland et al, appellants; appeal from Multnomah county; writ of review seeking to overturn ordinance assessing property relative to improvement of Holgate street; opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge W. N. Gatens reversed and case remanded.

Joseph Rohrbacher, appellant, vs I. H. Strain; appeal from Multnomah county; suit in equity to set aside a deed. Opinion by Justice Burnett; Judge J. P. Kavanaugh affirmed.

### HOLLAND TO REPLY TO ALLIES IN FEW DAYS

The Hague, Jan. 20.—The demand of the allies upon Holland for the surrender of former Emperor William reached The Hague late Saturday night through the ambassador of the Netherlands at Paris, whom it was handed Friday by the general secretary of the peace conference. The Dutch government yesterday acknowledged its receipt.

High officials of the Dutch government have given assurance that an answer to the allied demand upon Holland for the extradition of former Emperor William will be forthcoming within a few days.

The government is being advised in the case by the best Dutch lawyers and not by the court of justice.

### Homes Await Soldiers If Congress Will Act, Is Claim

Washington, Jan. 20.—From thirty to fifty thousand former service men are claiming fifty-acre tracts on existing reclamation projects if congress grants the proposed \$250,000,000 reclamation appropriation, the house ways and means committee was told today.

Governor Davis of Idaho said the 32 reclamation projects in the west might be extended so as to reclaim 3,000,000 acres of land. With Governor Campbell of Arizona, he approved the proposed \$250,000,000 government credits for the projects. Former service men would have a preference right of sixty days to settle on the land.
