Ex-President Taft And Senators Confer On Treaty
Washington, Jan. 24.—Former President Taft visited the capitol here today and conferred with Senators active in the movement for a peace treaty compromise.

During his visit to the senate, Mr. Taft addressed briefly representatives of a local committee which had invited him to talk at a mass meeting here in behalf of the treaty. He said he did not believe a compromise on the reservation affecting Article Ten of the League of Nations covenant would "kill the league."

I. W. W. TRIAL ON IN TACOMA.
Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 24.—The trial of 39 alleged I. W. W. workers, arrested after the Centralia Armistice Day shooting and charged with violating the state syndicalism law, began in superior court here yesterday. Judge Fletcher, presiding, refused to grant a motion of Ralph Pierce, attorney for most of the defendants, for separate trials. The judge decreed that all shall have their hearings before a single jury.

Conviction Of Smuggling Charge Wins Prison Term
San Francisco, Jan. 24.—Sentence of two years and one-half in the federal penitentiary at McNeil's Island, Wash., was imposed here today upon Laurence A. McBride, importer and exporter, by the United States district court, following conviction of concealing a shipment of goods in interstate commerce. It was charged McBride received a shipment from the east of \$10,000 a phenol, a drug, intended for trans-shipment to Kobe, in violation of federal laws regulating narcotics.

SOLDIERS MAY WEAR UNIFORMS.
Portland, Ore., Jan. 24.—Soldiers attending the trial of the I. W. W. members accused of the Armistice Day murders at Centralia, Wash., may wear their uniforms, although they are out of the service, the war department has advised Representative Johnson of the state of Washington, according to a dispatch received here today from Washington, D. C. The information was asked by members of the American Legion at Centralia.
