

LOYD-GEORGE IS SURPRISED "TIGER" WAS NOT ELECTED

Paris, Jan. 24.—His fortune has attended statesmen intimately associated with the framing of the treaty of Versailles in the opinion of Premier David Lloyd-George of Great Britain, according to a newspaper article published here.

Mr. Lloyd-George was so convinced Georges Clemenceau would be the next president of the French republic that he considered the race over. Therefore when he heard of the election of Paul Deschanel as president he could not refrain from expressing his astonishment.

"Who could have expected such a reversal of form?" he ejaculated when the result was announced.

In conversation with a number of the chamber of deputies, the British premier is said to have expressed an opinion that the "peace treaty was hard luck for anyone having had a hand in it."

"Yes," the deputy is quoted as replying, "Premier Orlando is out of office, Premier Clemenceau is again in private life and President Wilson has not met with reverses in Washington. Only you have been spared."

"You and in less than six months it will be my turn," is the reply attributed to the British leader.

MEDAL PROBE HALTS UNTIL NEXT WEEK

Washington, Jan. 24.—In order to allow time for bringing up to date the records of testimony already heard the senate sub-committee investigating the award of naval war medals was not in session today.

Chairman Hale announced that the next session probably would be held Tuesday at which time it is planned to hear Secretary Daniels whose action in changing a number of awards as recommended precipitated the controversy resulting in the inquiry.

After a journey of more than 10,000 miles, a warranty deed for a tract of land in Marion county now safely reposes in the vaults of the Marion county recorder's office.

The deed is made out by Mr. and Mrs. Don S. Colby of Broadacres, near Salem and transfers 10 acres to R. S. Blev.

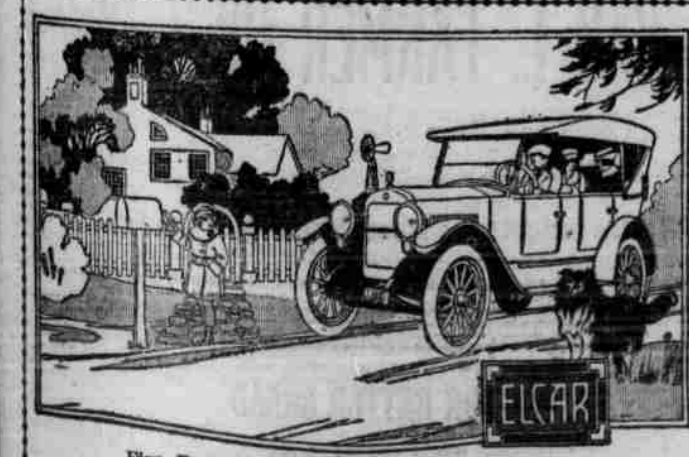

Deaths From Accidents During Week Total Three

Three deaths from accidents in industries are recorded in the list of 321 accidents reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending January 22. Of the accidents reported 282 were subject to the provisions of the compensation act, 21 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the provisions of the act and 18 were from public utility corporations not subject to the provisions of the act. The fatalities reported for the week were: Wm. C. Billings, foreman, Bend; Jas. A. Colestock, workman, Salem; George F. Diess, brakeman, Eugene.

COUNTY COURT SAVES \$4000 IN ROAD WORK

The Marion county commissioners have recently let the last large contract for county work on the Pacific highway, south of Salem. The county court, after advertising for bids for the removal of 5000 cubic yards of rock at Taylor's Canyon, seven miles south of Salem, received bids varying in estimate from 2.50 per to \$2.75.

After due deliberation, the court decided that the county might be saved a considerable sum of money if a more reasonable estimate could be secured, as it was evident that both bids included more "velvet" than was warranted.

The contract was finally let to A. C. Hansen of Mount Angel, who contracted to clear up the regrading for \$1.75 per cubic yard. The court estimates that this will effect a saving of at least \$4000 for the county. Work will begin on the cut at once, the county court being especially anxious to complete this section of the highway before summer traffic starts.

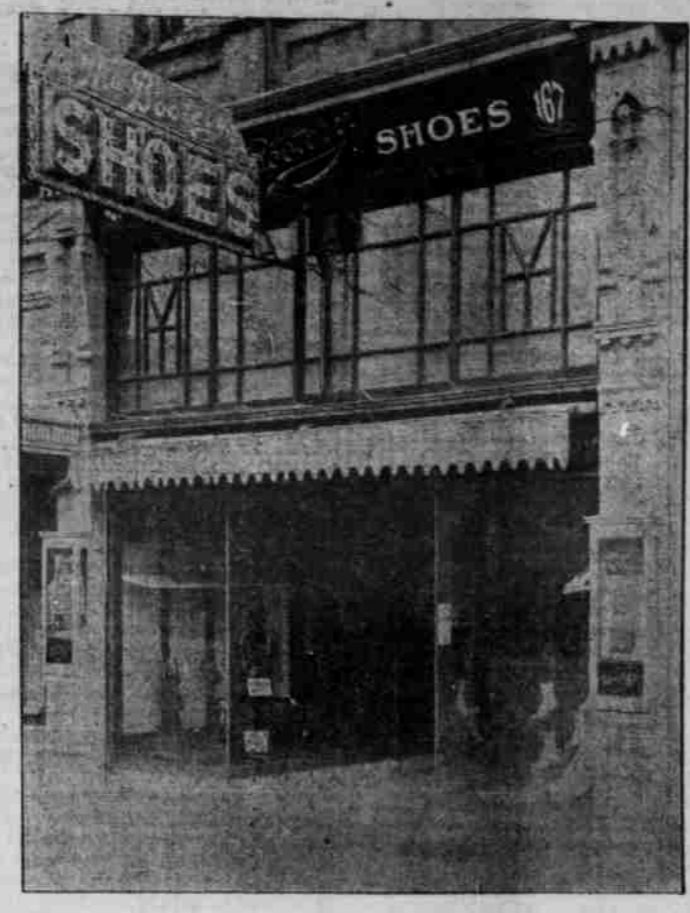
