City Institutes Action Against Tax Delinquents

City Attorney Bert Macy filed 22 additional tax liens Friday morning, with applications for foreclosure of certificates of tax delinquency. This makes a total of 35 liens so filed by the city of Salem. With one exception, the liens are against property in the Oaks addition of Sa em.

On January 17, one lien was filed and on January 22, the city took action against 12 more cases. The foreclosures if not contested or if carried by the city will affect nearly 50 parcels of Salem property.

New York, Jan. 30.—Art treasures valued at \$750,000 were destroyed today in a fire which swept through the annex of the American Fine Arts building in West 53rd street. The total loss is expected to exceed \$1,000,000. Most of the burned paintings were in the Vanderbilt exhibit.

HEARING CONVERTED TO SOCIALISM CLASS

Albany, N. Y. Jan. 28.—The assembly chamber in which the five suspended socialist assemblymen are being tried for alleged disloyalty today became a school room for the teaching of socialism.

Seated in a semi-circle around Seymour Steadman, defense counsel, and Algernon Lee of the socialist state committee, a witness, the assembly judiciary committee had read into the record what may be described as a "general history of socialism from 1864 to 1920."

In quizzing his "pupils" Mr. Steadman drew from Mr. Lee differentiations between socialist and anarchistic doctrines; names of leaders in both movements and a history of the
