

SALEM HI WINS FROM M'MINNVILLE 35-17

In a fast game at McMinnville, Salem high school won out last night in a hotly contested engagement with the McMinnville quintet, the score being 35 to 17.

One of the best features of the game in addition to excellent playing qualities shown by both teams was the noticeable absence of fouls. This is regarded as a result of the work of Coach Shott, new athletic instructor for Salem, who has expressed his belief that the Salem team can play a clean winning game.

Salem is now in line for Willamette valley honors at least as a result of the present season's showing, having lost only one game and that to Albany.

The regular high school team made the McMinnville trip. On Friday, the boys leave for Eugene, where they will play that high school, and then will stay over for Saturday night, in order to meet the Oregon freshman in a game.
