## BUDGET IS GOAL OF SCOUTS HERE IN WEEK DRIVE

Observance of National Boy Scout week in Salem next week will be a serious matter with the council and the various troops. There will be no clamorous celebrations that will mark the advent of the week in other cities; no bands will play; the scouts won't climb greased poles, scale the heights of buildings or go on paper chases. Because every ounce of energy the scouts can muster will be directed toward the raising of the budget for this year.

This was decided at a meeting Friday night of the scout council in the Commercial club, when plans were laid for raising the budget.

Good Times Urged.

Perhaps the only participation the Salem scouts will have in the week will be the inducement of every man, woman, girl and boy to do a good turn for some one each day during the week. Each scout will preach this; and each scout has pledged himself to observe the dictum personally.

The growth of the scout movement in Salem has been marked during the past year. A year ago there were 70 scouts in Salem. Now they number more than 200. This expansion of the movement has made it necessary to employ a trained scout executive, enlarge the scouting program and provide budget sufficient to promote the work.

## DONNELL WOULD GO TO G. O. P. ASSEMBLY FOR NATION LEAGUE

Adoption of the league of nations without reservations that would necessitate submitting the reservations or resubmitting the treaty to other signatory powers for further action on their part is strongly favored by M. Z. Donnell of the Dulles who on Friday filed with the secretary of state's office his application for a place on the republican primary ballot as a candidate for delegate from the second Oregon congressional district at the national republican convention in Chicago next June. Donnell is the first candidate to announce from the second district which is entitled to two delegates to the national convention. In his declaration of principles he says:

"I believe strongly in the league of nations and believe that the treaty should be adopted without reservations that would necessitate submitting the reservations or resubmitting the treaty to other signatory powers for further action on their part. I will obey the will of the people in reference to candidates as expressed at the primary but my personal preference is for the nomination of candidates who favor the league of nations."

The secretary of state is instructed to have after his name on the ballot: "Carry out the people's will expressed at the primary—adopt the league of nations."

**American Ambassador To Washington Is Replaced**

Mexico City, Feb. 7.—Ignacio Bonillas, Mexican ambassador at Washington, will turn the embassy over to Alfonso Siller, counselor, on February 11 and return to Mexico to engage in his campaign for the presidency, according to authoritative reports.

Senior Siller will leave Washington to become Mexican minister to Peru upon the arrival at the American capital of Salvador Diego Fernandez, formerly in charge of the foreign office here.

Walter Denton, scout commissioner, in speaking of scout week, declared Saturday:

"The Boy Scout movement is the greatest peace organization the world has ever had. The scout takes an oath to be true to God and his country. To keep himself physically fit, morally clean and mentally alert and to be prepared to serve and act in any emergency."

"Salem warranted in contributing this amount to the Boy Scout movement in this city?"

"To those who are not familiar with the movement, it might not be amiss to say,—ask any teacher in our public schools; any parent of a Boy Scout; any judge of our courts, or the police, the warden of the state prison, or superintendent of the boys' training school. The answer would be the same in every instance, to-wit—"It is the most paying investment that can be made."

"Scouts make better students in school. Better sons in the home. They are never mixed up in neighborhood trouble or before the juvenile courts, and do not become inmates of our penal institutions."

"Scouting builds for real patriotism and is the only effective weapon against bolshevism."

## FRENCH UNABLE TO UNDERSTAND CHANGE IN BRITAIN'S STAND

Paris, Feb. 7.—Astomishment has been caused in French circles by a change of attitude on the part of the British government regarding the extradition of Germans accused of violations of laws of war.

While it was understood that Great Britain was the most insistent of all powers represented at the peace conference in demanding the trial of former Emperor William and other prominent Germans, information has been received that the British now are showing a tendency to leave the initiative in the process of extradition to others.

It was said yesterday that Baron Birkenhead, lord chancellor of England, is understood to have made it clear the British government favored a radical modification of the list in order that an agreement with Germany might be reached.

Premier Millerand declared in the chamber of deputies last evening the allies would not evacuate the left bank of the Rhine until Germany had fulfilled all the terms of the Versailles treaty.

## BOAT COMPANY GIVEN RIGHT TO SELL STOCK

Permission to sell \$200,000 worth of its capital stock in Oregon was granted to the Inland Empire Boat & Truck company Saturday by Corporation Commissioner Schulderman. This company which was only recently granted articles of incorporation will operate a line of boats on the Columbia and Willamette rivers with a line of auto trucks as feeders for the boat line.
