MAHOOD ADDRESSES CONTINUE ALL WEEK

Last night at the First Methodist church a large and appreciative audience listened to the searching address of Dr. J. W. Mahood on the topic, "In Prison."

Dr. Mahood chose for his text the words of Jesus, "I was in prison, and ye came unto me," and by direct discourse impressed upon his hearers that Jesus wants all professing Christians to go to the souls imprisoned by appetites and passions and bring them the blessed gospel of freedom. He enumerated various kinds of prisons in which human souls were confined. There is the prison of appetite for strong drink. Thousands are bound in this prison and are absolutely helpless in its grip, but the gospel of the Son of God can set the infree and give them strength to conquer. The Son of God is a sure cure for the drink habit.

He referred to the prison of gambling which holds so many bound. He said, "The United States is fast becoming a nation of gamblers." The gambling spirit manifests itself in the business world in various schemes of chance used to stimulate sales. Even in some churches questionable practices have crept in. He condemned as of the devil church fairs and bazaars where chances are sold or raffling indulged in. He blamed church members for playing cards and teaching their children to play and thereby starting the madman to a gambler's hell.

The prison of lust is holding thousands of precious souls. He held the modern dance accountable for filling this prison. He said, "The evil force in the world today, especially the high school dance" and warned the Christian people to fight against it with all their powers.

And another prison which held many was that of worldliness—the desire on the part of church members to partake of the same enjoyments as the worldly people. All of these prisons held souls so bound as to destroy spiritual life. None found in these prisons can be filled with the Holy Spirit and without the Holy Spirit there is no power. But God has provided a way of escape, for Jesus Christ can remove the fetters from every soul that will trust him. And send him forth with a song and the power of the Holy Spirit.
