

ARGUMENTS IN FAVOR OF REFERRED BILLS ORDERED SENT IN

Arguments in support of referred measures authorized by the special legislative session for a place on the ballot at the special election May 21, must be in the hands of the secretary of state not later than March 1 to insure publication in the official voters pamphlet, according to Sam A. Koser, deputy secretary of state. Notice to this effect was being sent out by Koser Friday to the members of the legislative committees named by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house to prepare these arguments. The personnel of these committees which have just been filed with the secretary of state's office is as follows:

Constitutional amendment extending eminent domain over roads and highways—(S. J. R. 17, thirtieth legislative assembly, amending section 18, article 1)—Senator Handley and Representatives Beas and Fuller.
Constitutional amendment establishing limitation of four per cent state indebtedness for permanent roads—(H. J. R. 11)—Senators Eddy and Lachmund, and Representatives Gora, Graham and Stewart.
Constitutional amendment restoring capital punishment—(S. J. R. 8)—Committee on affirmative argument: Senator Eddy and Representatives Kuhl and Lofgren. Committee on negative argument: Senator Strayer and Representatives Mrs. Thompson and E. E. Smith.
Crook and Curry county bonding amendment—(H. J. R. 7)—Senators Baldwin and Eberhard and Representatives Bardick and Thrift.
Governatorial succession amendments—(S. J. R. 19)—Senators Mow and Banks and Representatives Coffey, Lewis and Woodson.
Higher educational tax act—(H. B. 56)—No committee authorized.
Soldiers educational aid revenue bill—(H. B. 46)—Senators Pierce and E. Smith, and Representatives David M. Graham, Martin and Brownell.
State elementary school fund tax—(H. B. 24)—No committee authorized.
Blind school tax measure—(H. B. 77)—No committee authorized.

Water Permits

The appropriation of water from Henline creek a tributary of Little North Fork of the Santiam river for the development of 115 horsepower for mining purposes is sought by the Silver King Mining company of Albany in an application filed with State Engineer Copper today. The proposed mining development is located in eastern Marion county and it is estimated that the development will entail an expenditure of approximately \$10,000. The power is to be used in the reduction of gold, silver, lead and zinc ores.
Other applications for water rights were filed today as follows:
By William F. Witham of Hood River, covering the appropriation of water from a spring for the irrigation of a small tract in Hood River county.
By M. J. O'Connor of Denio, Ore., for the appropriation of water from a spring and artesian well for the irrigation of a small tract in Harney county.
By G. W. Davidson and others for the construction of a reservoir on the South Fork of Rock Creek for the storage of water and the appropriation of such stored water for irrigation purposes near Haynes in Baker county.
By A. Learned of Applegate, Ore., covering the appropriation of water from a spring for the supplemental supply for the irrigation of a 500-acre tract in Jackson county.

COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR WILL RESIGN MARCH 1

P. H. Holmes, for two years a deputy under Sheriff Needham, has tendered his resignation to take effect March 1. Mr. Holmes has accepted a position with the downtown branch of the Cross Meat company.

He has been in charge of the tax collecting department of the sheriff's office since the resignation of George Paulus, September 1. Mr. Paulus also resigned in order to accept a better position and a salary increase over the nominal figure which the county is enabled to pay.

Mr. Holmes is the second member of the court house staff to resign since the first of the year, H. H. Kloepping resigning his position in County Clerk U. G. Boyer's office, February 1. Mr. Kloepping accepted a position in the offices of the state industrial accident commission.

A general sentiment of disapproval by the taxpayers of this county has prevented the county court from increasing salaries of efficient clerical employees sufficiently to compare with the scale paid by private concerns or even with the state salary schedule. Should the present state of affairs continue, it is conceded that the county will eventually lose because of inability to retain efficient help for any period of time.

Sheriff W. I. Needham, in receiving Deputy Holmes' resignation, stated that Mr. Holmes has established a good record for praiseworthy and consistent service while in his present position.

French Aviator Crosses Andes Range Wednesday

Santiago, Chile, Feb. 12.—Lieutenant Prieur, of the French aviation mission, made a successful flight across the Andes yesterday. Leaving Mendoza, Argentina, he landed eight kilometers beyond Ovalle, province of Coquimbo, Chile. The aviator was slightly injured through a bad landing in which his machine was destroyed.

More Than Half of Y.W.C.A. Fund Raised, Two Days Left

Two thousand seven hundred and eighty dollars, more than half the budget fund for which the Y. W. C. A. drive is being carried on, have been raised by the workers in two past three days. With but Friday and Saturday remaining in which to complete the campaign, a special meeting of captains and assistants was held in the Commercial club Friday morning to make plans for the completion of the drive in the allotted time. The budget calls for \$5000.

New Haven Newspapers Suspend, Strike Cause

New Haven, Conn., Feb. 13.—Temporary suspension of publication of the four daily newspapers here is the result of a strike of printers. The three afternoon papers published today carried only announcements of the suspension.

RETURN OF SCHLESBURG RECALLS OLD SPLIT

Copenhagen, Feb. 12.—In a council of state held yesterday in response to an enthusiastic reference by Premier Zahle to the result of the plebiscite in the northern zone of Schleswig, King Christian recalled with emotion how his grandfather fifty-six years ago had voiced the sorrow of the Danes over the dismemberment of their country but had told them to cherish the hope that their territory one day would be restored. The king added that his father also had hoped to live long enough to see the nation again united but that fate had denied him this privilege.

"It is my happy, if undesired, fortune to see this day," said King Christian. "Humbly thanking God and in fond remembrance of those dead and living who fought to preserve Danish Schleswig, I send the first greeting of welcome to my returning compatriots whose love of their mother country has only been strengthened by their long and trying period of alienation from her."
