BAKER TAKES STEPS TO INSURE RETURN OF DEAD VETERANS

Washington, Feb. 13.—Definite steps looking toward the return of America's soldier dead from France were taken Thursday when Secretary Baker appointed Colonel Henry Rethers, head of the grave registration service in Europe and Colonel Bentley Mott, military attaché at Paris, as American members of the Franco-American commission, which will have charge of the work.

The appointments were in accordance with an agreement with the French government concluded in August 1918, providing for the creation of the commission immediately after repatriation of all American troops in France. The agreement authorized the commission to examine measures to be taken to insure, in conformity with French laws and police regulations regarding hygiene, the return to America of American dead. French members of the commission, the war department has been advised, will be chosen soon.

The French government, in the opinion of state and war department officials will be bound by the agreement to permit the return of the bodies buried in France, although up to this time, disinterment from the battle zone has been refused.

Ralph Hayes, assistant to the secretary of war, will sail for France soon to arrange for the return of bodies interred in the rear areas. He will also inspect sites for American fields of honor, where the bodies of soldiers, whose nearest of kin desire retention overseas, will be given a permanent place of rest.

MOTHER CONFESSES TO BEATING YOUTH WHO DIED OF HURTS

Rhineland, Wis., Feb. 13.—Mrs. Stanley Blomski, mother of Alban Blomski, six year old boy found dead several weeks ago at the Blomski farmhouse at Sugar Camp, has confessed to beating the boy with a heavy poker and a razor stop, according to District Attorney A. J. Omella.

Mrs. Blomski is said to have signed an affidavit exonerating her husband of beating the boy.

Both Mrs. Blomski and her husband were held for trial following a verdict by a coroner's jury that the boy's death was caused by beatings and neglect at the hands of his parents.

Questioned regarding a broken arm discovered by physicians when performed an autopsy, she is alleged to have said that it was the result of one of her beatings and that the member had been broken and unattended for nearly two months.

Asked why she had not supplied the boy with shoes to withstand the severe winter weather, she is said to have replied: "He wanted to wear shoes all summer so I punished him by not giving him any in the winter."

The boy's feet, it was brought out at the inquest had been frozen when he was punished by being put out in a shed in below zero weather and made to stay there for some time.

SOCIALIST PROBE GOES ON

New York, Feb. 13.—District Attorney Martin of Bronx county today directed his assistant to consult with counsel of the assembly judiciary committee which is investigating the "virulence" of the five suspended socialist assemblymen, and to present to the grand jury at the earliest possible moment any evidence supporting charges of sedition or criminal anarchy.

YANKEE CAPTURE QUERY ASKED

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 13.—Instructions have been received by the American embassy at Mexico City to take up the question of the detention of Lieutenants L. M. Wolf and G. E. Usher, American aviators, by the municipal authorities at Navojoa, Sonora. It was announced at military headquarters here today.

NEWBERRY SOUGHT TO INTIMIDATE MEN EVEN THRU COURTS

Grand Rapids, Mich., Feb. 13.—William H. McKeighan, former alderman and mayor of Flint, Mich., who in August 1918 was under sentence to the penitentiary for assault and robbery, testified in the Newberry election conspiracy trial Thursday that he was told by Richard R. Fletcher, a defendant, that if he supported Senator Truman H. Newberry in the senatorial primaries his case would be reversed by the state supreme court, but otherwise he would "be let go to jail."

Fletcher is state labor commissioner. The witness said the remark was made in the presence of Paul King, Newberry campaign manager, and others.

Under cross-examination McKeighan said he knew nothing against the integrity of the Michigan supreme court or any member of it and when asked if he believed Fletcher's statement, he replied: "Politics is funny. I was taking chances."

W. J. Crotty, a former employee of the Newberry estate testified that contributions to the campaign fund by John Newberry, brother of the senator, amounted to between \$15,000 and \$20,000 by June 15, 1918.

Marion Hanson, a banker from Grayling, Mich., said he found a fifty dollar bill in a magazine which B. Frank Emery, senatorial committeeman, picked up and placed before him and that he defendant explained it was for possible expense in circulating petitions. The banker said he used \$15 and retained the other \$35.

ARMENIANS REPORTED SLAIN

London, Feb. 13.—The Armenian national delegation here states that it has received a message from Constantinople saying that during the recent attacks by nationalist forces on Marash and Aintab, in Asia Minor, about 2000 Armenian civilians were murdered in cold blood.

STEAMER DOCKS IN FLAMES

San Francisco, Feb. 13.—The British steamer Tyndareus from Seattle arrived at Yokohama with fire in No. 7 hatch, according to advices to the marine department of the chamber of commerce today. The blaze was under control.

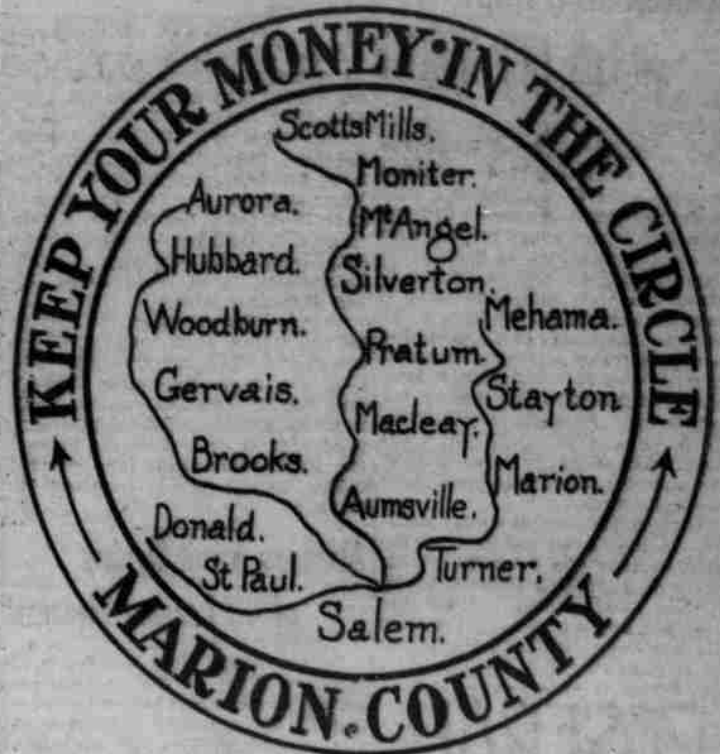

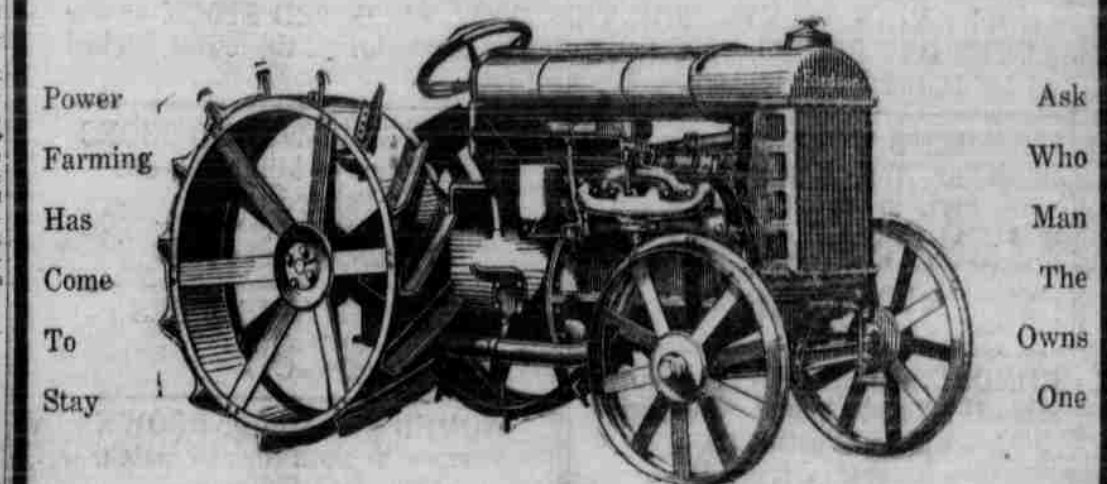
