General Electric lost three points on a single sale and Mexican Petroleum, United States Rubber and Retail Stores forfeited one point each. This was offset by gains of 1 to 1 1/2 points for Northern Pacific, Louisville and Nashville, General Motors and Pan-American Petroleum. Crucible Steel opened with an offering of 300 shares at 208 to 214, a maximum gain of 2 1/2 points.

The first is for the establishment of a great money combine with the object of financing great national and private enterprises in Europe, while the second is the establishment of a great international trading company backed by the resources of the Morgan house and the Guaranty Trust company.
