

BEARCATS TO MEET M.A.A.C. IN PORTLAND FOR A GAME TONIGHT

The Willamette Bearcats will line up against the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club in Portland this evening. In what is likely to be one of the fastest game Portland fans will see this year.

Coach Mathews' string of loopers came back from their northern trip much demoralized, but a rest of almost two weeks has put them in first class shape again. Jackson, Rarey and Gillette have been given light work since the trip, and Wapato has been at home in Wenatchee up to Wednesday, when he returned to work with new pep.

The team has shown noticeable improvement in passing and instead of shooting whenever they had the ball in their end of the court, they are now working it up to easy shooting distance.

The game tonight is just what the men need to put them in shape for the two hard contests coming with Stanford and University of Idaho. Stanford will appear here Tuesday night, while Idaho lines up against the Bearcats at 4 p. m. Thursday. Idaho won from the Methodists on the Moscow floor, but the Bearcats are counting on evening up the score in the armory.

Stanford cleaned up on the University of Oregon last week, so a fast contest is assured. Very likely Tuesday night will see the biggest crowd which has turned out for any of the games in the armory this year.

Dempsey Denies Rumor of Break With Kearns

Chicago, Feb. 21.—Jack Dempsey, the world's heavyweight champion, in a message to friends here today denied reports that he intended to break with his manager, Jack Kearns.

"Kearns will be manager as long as I remain in the boxing game," the champion's message read. "I give him credit for my success as a pugilist and becoming world's champion."

BASKETBALL

Stanford University, Cal., Feb. 21.—Stanford's basketball quintet will make its first invasion of the northwest next week where it will play the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural College teams. A two game series is scheduled with each team. Coach Evans team will meet Oregon on Monday and Tuesday and O. A. C. on Thursday and Friday.

Berkeley, Cal., Feb. 21.—The University of Oregon basketball team defeated the University of California five 29 to 27 in the first of a two game Pacific Conference series here last night. The second game will be played tomorrow night.

California lead at the end of the first half by a score of 14 to 10. Durso, Oregon forward and the smallest player on either team, was the star of the game, scoring 17 of the 19 points Oregon chalked up in the second half.

BRITONS DO NOT HAVE TO AID POLAND, CLAIM
London, Thursday, Feb. 19.—Great Britain is not committed in any way to come to the support of Poland with men, money and munitions if parts of Russia, such as Bessarabia, now occupied by Polish armies are attacked by the Bolsheviks. Premier Lloyd-George declared in the house of commons today in answer to a question.

MEXICAN-BRITISH RELATIONS RESUME

Mexico City, Feb. 21.—Persisten reports that diplomatic relations between Mexico and Great Britain were about to be resumed were partially confirmed yesterday when it was learned from semi-official sources that Robert Leech, British minister to Cuba is to be sent to this city. General Candido Aguilar, it is said, will go to England as soon as formalities are completed.

General Aguilar was granted unlimited leave of absence from the army yesterday for the announced purpose of engaging in politics. He is a supporter of Yimacio Bonillas, former Mexican ambassador at Washington.

Chinese Shipyard to Launch Yankee Ship

Shanghai, Feb. 15.—The celestian, the first American government ship ever built in a Chinese shipyard, will be launched here in March from the ways of the Kiangnan Dock and Engineering works, according to present plans of the builders. This boat will be followed at intervals of six weeks by three others that are being built in Shanghai for the United States shipping board. All of the four vessels are cargo carriers of 10,000 dead weight tons each.

Museum of War Inventions
The French Government has decided to establish a museum of war inventions which were brought to the front during the great war and which were instrumental in winning the decision for the Allies. It is said that this institution will be of great value to the students in the various military and naval institutions.

ALBANY BEATS SALEM 16-14 IN FAST GAME

Grand stand plays and a lack of team work are credited as being the underlying causes of Salem meeting defeat at the hands of Albany in a game played at the Willamette University gym, Friday night. This is Albany's second win from Salem during the Willamette valley basketball series.

After a bad start, the home team attempted to rally, but despite excellent work by two members of the team the entire game showed a lack of co-ordination among the S. H. S. players.

The game was practically "no man's" until the last moment Boise and Gill of Salem each secured four points. For Albany, Moores and Willard checked three baskets and a foul. The game, while inconsistent, was fast and maintained vivid interest until the finish.

Supporters of the Salem school and the team itself are thought to have built too much upon Salem's record of defeating all teams played by Albany in the series.

Despite the two Albany defeats, Salem high school is the holder of the Valley championship for this season, having won seven games out of the nine played. Coach Scott expects that the team will put up a mighty good fight for the interstate championship in June.

Universal Suffrage Demonstration Held

Tokio, Wednesday, Feb. 11.—The universal suffrage demonstration which had long been planned for today in the hope of influencing pending legislation, proved something of a disappointment. It had been announced that 100,000 persons would engage in it but those actually participating were less than one quarter of this number. The city was strongly guarded and the utmost good nature prevailed.

Paraders visited the diet building, the suffrage headquarters and the palace. After cheering for the emperor, the crowd dispersed.

The British government has introduced a bill to fulfill their election pledges to remove sex disqualification of women for various judicial appointments. Under the bill women may serve as jurors, be created justices of the peace, and they are eligible to all branches of the civil service except the Indian Civil Service.

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DUTCH MAY PROTECT EX-KAISER AT DOARN

The Hague, Saturday, Feb. 21.—Before answering the last allied note relative to the extradition of former Emperor William, the Dutch government is expected to assure itself that the erstwhile monarch is willing to settle down for life at Doorn and not disturb the world's peace. While, in answering the original demand for extradition, the Dutch government acting without consulting Count Hohenzollern in any way, a different course may be pursued in the present instance.

Holland will undoubtedly reply she is willing to guard William of Hohenzollern closely at Doorn and accept responsibility for preventing any danger to the world peace, but it will probably be necessary to consult the exile before replying. No difficulty is anticipated in this connection as Count Hohenzollern is reported to be ready to accept Doorn as a haven for the rest of his life.

Incorporations.

The Harrisburg Lumber and Manufacturing company of Harrisburg, Linn county, capitalized at \$75,000 filed articles of incorporation with the corporation department here today. The incorporators are Otto C. Luecke, George J. Wilhelm and Robt K. Burton.

Articles were also filed today by the Sparks Amusement company, of London, capitalized at \$15,000 with J. B. Sparks, Lillie Cross and Dan Thorvenel named as the incorporators.

Permission to operate in Oregon was granted by the department today to the Sumpter Valley Smelter company, a Washington corporation, capitalized at \$500,000. J. A. Gyllenberg of Baker is named as attorney in fact for Oregon.

School Report Shows Good Work in All Districts

The office of County Superintendent of Schools W. M. Smith has completed a compilation of school activities in Marion county districts for the month of January, 1920. The report gives all schools credit for unusually good attendance during the mid-winter month. The work of the school supervisors and of the county superintendent in school inspection is also shown. One factor which tended to interfere with school work during the first month of the year was the prevalence of contagious diseases.

Eugene Expecting To Get Terminal Now At Junction

Eugene Or., Feb. 21.—It has been reported here in connection with the return of the railroads to private ownership that the through freight division which has been located at Junction City for many years soon will be changed to Eugene. All through freight trains would then be made up in Eugene instead of Junction City, which is 14 miles north of Eugene. The train men's run would extend from Portland to Eugene and from Eugene to Roseburg.

Before the government took over the railroads the company changed the local freight division from Junction City to Eugene and it was semi-officially announced at that time that the through freight division would be moved to this city but soon afterward the war came on and plans were dropped for the time being.

Eugene is the terminus of the Coos Bay branch, the West Side branch, the Wendling branch and the Oak Ridge branch, and trains from all of these make this city their headquarters.
