After several years of successful service,—under careful management the hospital developed into a thriving institution. institution and one of the best nurses training school in the northwest.

The state finding it necessary to have more land for the receiving ward for the state hospital and the Salem hospital having more land than it required for hospital purposes, the state gave the Salem hospital \$25,000 for their building, which had become inadequate, and part of the land, and by arrangement with the city of Salem the Salem hospital was granted the use of the McKinley school until arrangements could be made for a permanent hospital building.

The time has now come that the city requires the McKinley school for school purposes, and it is necessary for Salem to now erect a hospital worthy of the town.

The hospital has now accumulated holdings in land, buildings, equipment and cash that net \$65,000, this being done without ever asking one penn, from the citizens of Salem.

The hospital project is one that, it is felt, should receive the support of ev-ery citizen of Salem, as it is to be a hospital built for the people and by the people, strictly a public institution handled by an elective board repre-sentative of all phases of Salem's civic life.
