

RECORD SALE FOR POWDER DUE TO LAND CLEARING

The Watt Shipp Powder company last month sold eight carloads of DuPont explosives in the Willamette valley. This is the record sale of DuPont explosives for this company in the fourteen years they have been in the powder business. Two hundred thousand pounds of powder in one month is an enormous amount of explosives. This demand is attributed to three types of work now all in full momentum—road building, logging industry and last but by no means the least of these activities, land clearing. By these activities, land clearing, by the progressive farmers who are clearing off land preparatory to sowing out berries, orchard and hops, recognizing that the record breaking powder, and a rapid climb will commence before the close of 1920.

Mr. Shipp, in an interview, stated that he attributed their record breaking powder sales last month was chiefly due to the fact of the present advance in farm produce and the rise in the price of land. He went on to say, the Oregon farmer and especially those of the Willamette valley have come to realize their opportunity, not only in having ready outlet for all produce right at their door, but also that eastern capital is becoming interested in the possibilities of this section and the sale of lands is now an everyday occurrence. Of course, as he points out, the cleared lands have the preference and command the price.

Mr. Shipp operates the powder business in the entire Willamette valley from Aurora to Roseburg, each year improving his facilities for handling this valuable product which may rightly be termed—"man's greatest aid" in development work.

Fishermen Down Big Project; Will Not Work Sunday

London, March 8.—Lord Leverhulme, has encountered the religious prejudices of the Scotchmen who live on the extensive property he has purchased in the Outer Hebrides and has suffered a rebuff. He had planned to make Stornoway, on the island of Lewis, the headquarters of a huge fishing fleet that should sweep the seas for 500 miles around. The project involved Sunday labor and the islanders who adhere to the strict and intense form of the Presbyterian faith, rejected it.

Commenting on the incident, the periodical, Common Sense, says: "Lord Leverhulme is a man of big ideas and new ideas while the population over whom he has declared the rights of lordship are folk of old and intense ideas. Hence the inevitable collision."

Argentina Paper Is Purchased By American Capital

Buenos Aires, Argentine, Mar. 8.—The Buenos Aires Herald, a member of the Associated Press, established forty years ago as a newspaper devoted to British interests in Argentina, hereafter will be an Anglo-American journal. A number of American residents of this city have joined with British residents here in the formation of a company which has purchased the control of the Herald from Thomas Bell, the present proprietor, the arrangement to become effective April 1.

The company will have three American and three British directors and its policy will be "to further the interests of the British and North American communities in this and the neighboring republics and to foster the good relations which now exist between this and their countries."

Wireless Device Is Innovation In Signal Apparatus

London, Mar. 8.—A novel wireless emergency calling device by which ships in distress can ring alarm bells in other ships within wireless range is reported by the American chamber of commerce in London.

The present wireless system of communication requires that an operator to hear a call must be on duty wearing the usual telephone headset. The new device is said to enable any station or ship equipped with a special automatic transmitter key to call up any station or ship within range, fitted with a corresponding selective receiver relay, even if the operator is absent. The calling up, according to the American chamber, is effected by a ball which starts ringing on the ships called.

It is claimed that one of the most important uses of the device will be to ensure immediate and general attention to S. O. S. calls.

Nationalization Of Fisheries Is Urged In Canada

Victoria, B. C., Mar. 8.—Government operation of British Columbia's north Pacific fishing industry has been urged by William Sloan, provincial minister of fisheries, as a means of preventing the depletion of the salmon runs.

Mr. Sloan recently asked the Canadian federal government at Ottawa to take over and operate the fisheries. He told Ottawa that if the federal government did not want to take up the task the British Columbia government would like to have the privilege of doing so.

"Nationalization of the fishing industry would prevent depletion of the salmon fisheries, would insure continuation of the fishing industry and would eliminate useless competition and excessive overhead charges," Mr. Sloan declared recently in explaining his idea.

Fear that private operation of fisheries will wipe out the ocean salmon just as the Fraser river salmon runs were wiped out was expressed by the minister. The Fraser river, once the greatest salmon river in the world, Mr. Sloan asserted, is practically fished out.

Christian Science Case Decision Made

Boston, Mass., Mar. 8.—The trustees of the Christian Science Publishing society may not be controlled by the directors of the mother church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in the opinion of Judge Frederic Dodge, whose finding as master in the Christian Science suits was filed with the supreme judicial court of the state. The master also finds that the directors had no legal right to remove John V. Dittermore from their own board, or Lamont Rowlands from the board of trustees.

The original draft of the master's findings was prepared two months ago.

The directors already have indicated that they proposed to continue the fight before the full bench of the state supreme court.
