Seven Tentative Jurors Selected to Try Radicals

Walla Walla, Wash., Mar. 18.—Seven men had tentatively been accepted as jurors to hear the evidence and try the three alleged I. W. W. placed on trial in the superior court before Justice Mills when the noon recess was called. The defendants, Dan Stewart, O. Kowalechuk and Joe Mackaskill, were arrested in a raid by Sheriff David Yates and his deputies upon the railroad camp last November and are charged with criminal syndicalism as defined under the law enacted March 19, 1919.

The jury box was quickly filled when court convened and the defendants had been brought within the railing. Three lawyers, assigned by the court when Alexander Markel of Yakima and Ralph Pearce of Seattle suddenly deserted the men and left them to their own resources, are defending them. They are C. M. Rader, W. A. Toner and J. C. Hurapool. County Prosecutor Earl Benson, Assistant Prosecutor A. J. Gillis and Special Prosecutor John Simpson are handling the state's case.

Colby Testifies Before Senate Probers Today

Washington, Mar. 18.—Embassy Colby made an extensive statement to the senate foreign relations committee today regarding the information on which the committee is delaying action on his confirmation as secretary of state.

Larger Wrecking Force To Be Sent To Rescuers Of H-1

San Francisco, Mar. 18.—Due to the continuation of unfavorable weather conditions more vessels are to be sent to the aid of those endeavoring to salvage the submarine H-1, which was stranded on the beach at the entrance of Magdalena Bay with the loss of her commander and three other members of the crew, the twelfth naval district headquarters announced here today. Messages from the scene today were to the effect that high winds and a pounding surf were preventing the salvagers from pulling the vessel into deep water.

The vessels to be sent would be announced later in the day, it was said.

Strike Situation In Germany Better

Paris, Mar. 18.—The general situation in Germany has much improved since yesterday according to dispatches received by the German peace delegation here today.

The only serious trouble is now confined to the industrial centers and the Ruhr valley, where the Spartacists are still preventing the reestablishment of order.
