Oregon Watching California's Act On Gas Increase

Portland, Mar. 20.—Not until the California public service commission completes its investigation into the rise in the price of gasoline and learns whether or not its powers permit it to regulate gasoline prices will the public service commission of Oregon take steps toward seeking a reduction in the price of gasoline in this state.

This was the opinion of Chairman Buchtel of the Oregon commission, who arrived in the city from Salem and who evinced keen interest in the news dispatches from California, which stated the California commission would seek to lower the price of gasoline in that state.

"The California commission, however, is somewhat different than Oregon," he said. "There they have ample opportunity of prosecuting an investigation right in the oil fields to determine the cost of production and thus learn whether or not the increased price is justified.

"If the California commission finds there is no justification for the increase, naturally the Oregon commission will be just as eager to bring about a reduction in this state, if proper authority to do so is vested in the commission."

Firing Breaks Out in Berlin; Anxiety Grows

Berlin, Mar. 22.—(By the Associated Press 2:40 p. m. by wireless)—Since noon firing has occurred in various parts of the city. It is reported that the security police are shooting down all officers of the Baltic troops remaining in Berlin.

Unter Den Linden bristled today with barbed wire and the Hotel Adlon was thoroughly screened with it, and guarded by troops. Wild rumors are afloat, becoming grotesquely magnified in circulation.

The inner city streets are seething with excited people. Disorders are occurring in the suburban districts. There is a conspicuous absence of troops in the working men's dwelling districts where agitators are feverishly busy.

3 Communists Found Guilty of Syndicalism

Portland, Or., Mar. 22.—Three alleged members of the communist party of Oregon, on trial here for 14 days on charges of violating the state syndicalism act, were found guilty by a jury in circuit court today. Sentence will be passed March 25, court announced. The penalty provides for a maximum of 10 years imprisonment.

The jury recommended leniency. The three men found guilty are Karl W. Oster, state secretary of the Communist labor party; Claude Hurd and Fred W. Fry.

The case was given to the jury late yesterday and was the first to be tried in the state under the Oregon criminal syndicalism law.

Memorial Trees Planted in France

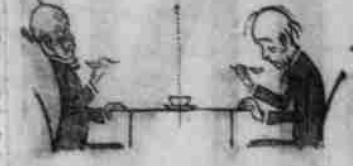
Washington, Mar. 20.—On the battlefields where American soldiers gave their lives when the call from humanity came, France is planting trees sent by the American forestry association.

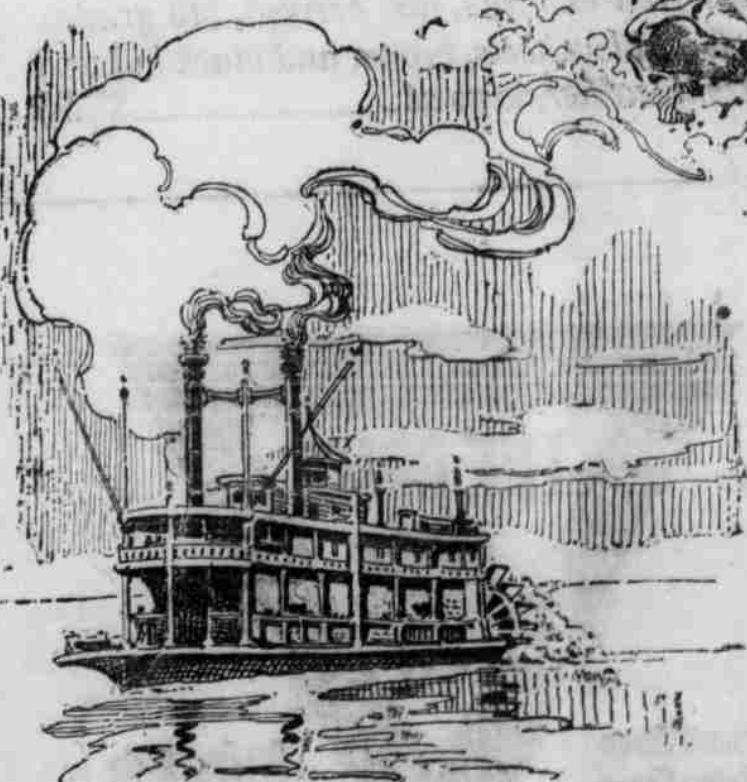
