

Salesmen's Club Organization Is Formally Made

With a score of the liveliest salesmen in the city putting it across, the Salesmen's club, joint body to the Salem Commercial club, was formed at a meeting in the auditorium of the club Monday night of the associate members. The organization of the Salesmen's club is the outcome of several months' discussion and planning, and the organization has the endorsement of the Commercial club board of directors.

The club voted as its president John F. Hutchason, representative here of the Mutual Life Insurance company, F. W. Jobleman, night clerk at the Hotel Bligh, is vice-president, and J. W. Chambers Jr., young furniture dealer, is secretary-treasurer. A board of directors, consisting of five members, was named as follows: Harry D. Watson, of the Associated Oil company; E. E. McDonough, salesman at the Price Shoe store; O. D. Olson, salesman at the C. B. Clancy floral shop; F. W. Johnson, and J. W. Chambers Jr.

Live Programs Promised.

The club will meet the second Monday in each month. The next meeting of the Salesmen will be April 12. A permanent program committee, whose duties shall be to provide "live" and suitable entertainment at the meetings, follows: T. E. McCroskey, James Elvin and J. P. Hutchason. Two other members are to be named by the president.

Although an organization committee of ten members was named, each member of the club was instructed to try to induce one more than to join the organization. The membership committee as chosen is: E. E. McDonough, O. D. Olson, H. D. Watson, P. A. Germain, G. W. Stoner, D. J. Gilliam, F. C. Butler, A. B. Myers, Prof. F. G. Franklin and James R. Wood.

Constitution Adopted.

The constitution and bylaws, as passed by the board of directors of the Commercial club, was adopted tentatively by the Salesmen's club.

A brief talk on the aims of the organization and its value to salesmen in any line was made by James Elvin, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. and an ardent booster of salesmanship.

According to tentative plans the Salesmen's club will be addressed by competent speakers on salesmanship, and kindred subjects. Pleasure will be combined with business, as expressed by Mr. Hutchason, and the members will form in a general movement for the betterment of themselves as salesmen and in the promotion of the welfare of the city.

Public Forum

Editor Journal—It is not popular to resist the salary expansion movement but a few principles must be observed by all citizens who are engaged in the campaign to preserve our American ideals. The world war has destroyed the old balance of values and relations between the citizen and government on two lines. First, there has been an enormous resort to socialism—that is, the functions of government have been multiplied, by creating commissions, departments, state and federal taxes and licenses to do business, until the average family is said to pay two dollars per month in taxes of various kinds, and business men and private corporations a great deal more. Second, the number of office holders has been multiplied and the wages paid has been advanced from fifty to one hundred percent.

The old American maxim that the people who are governed least are the people who are governed best has been entirely swept away. With the cry for higher salaries the burdens of government have been doubled and are to be tripled and quadrupled if it is permitted. Long since the citizen ceased to be the governing influence. That power in the selection of candidates and carrying the elections, in framing legislation and creating offices and raising salaries has long since been taken out of the hands of the more private citizen, the taxpayer and self-sustaining business man and has been monopolized by those who are theoretically supposed to be public servants but have become the controlling power in public affairs. It is hardly respectable to be a mere tax paying contributor to the support of the various political machines. They pre-

pare the bills that go before the legislature. They derive the demands for new millage taxes. They have printing offices, they have time and money and trained workers to carry on the campaigns to befoul the voters into accepting greater and greater burdens of taxation. So we have a complete inversion of the doctrine that the people rule. We have entered the stage where the people are ruled by the official classes as completely as the monarchists and aristocracy of Russia ever ruled the peasant masses.

The mass meeting of taxpayers held at Salem Saturday was composed of substantial and fair minded persons who own property and do not get back all they pay to support government from five to twenty times over out of their fellow taxpayers. Can they have any influence on the situation? Mr. Greenbaum and the few officials of the Taxpayers league cannot begin to put up the campaign that the organized officialism of the state can carry on, in fact have already organized and are carrying on. What private citizen not in the pay of the state has the time or the money to spare to travel about over the state and appeal to this or that group selfishly interested in promoting the millage taxes? Not one. Mr. Greenbaum and the rest of the men named with him to look after the interests of the taxpayers have little time to give from saving their own business from running away with them. The office holders have the double drop always on the private business man or woman. They are free to take up any private business or occupation that offers them better employment. Private citizens or business persons have only the chance of success in their own business. They can jump into public employment only by the political game. Those in political jobs have the time, the acquaintance, the money of the taxpayer and his time to carry on their advancement and promotion of their own financial interests, whereas the citizen must use his or her own means. The fight of the taxpayers to have off the constantly encroaching wave of taxation and confiscation is a losing one. It is a two to one bet that all the various millage taxes will be carried by default of the citizenry to turn out in their own interest, when every group of the selfishly interested voters will be at the polls, May 21st. We are too far gone in the establishment of the ruling oligarchy to hold our own. The proposed millage taxes and the regular state, county and local taxes this year, on the valuation of 1919, if all the demands carry, will transfer at least thirty million dollars from the pockets of the taxpayers to the pockets of the beneficiaries. The legislature of Oklahoma at the last session appropriated eleven million as against the Oregon legislature fourteen millions, according to the figures printed and we have about one third the wealth and population of that state. Our next contribution to organized officialism will be about forty dollars per capita, man, woman, children and dogs. Yet, we say the people rule. I know that a story rebuke is awaiting the activities of the Marion county taxpayers league, as the rating class has always captured our state taxpayers league. We will do well if we escape indictment as had and undesirable citizens if we keep up our fight against jumping the state levy from 3.23 to eight mills.

Improvements In Mexican Market News Announced

San Francisco, Mar. 23.—By furnishing reliable and up-to-date trade information direct from Mexican cities, such as Guadalajara, Monterey, San Luis Potosi and Pecos, so that business men of California will not have to make all their inquiries through Mexico City, Nicerfo Zambrano, the new Mexican consul general at San Francisco, is seeking to build up friendly trade relations between the two countries.

Senator Zambrano proposes to have monthly trade bulletins sent from all the large Mexican cities, enumerating the products for export, with their prices as far as possible and other desirable information. In addition the bulletins will state what goods the Mexican merchants are in need of and the desired methods of shipment.

Supplementing this will be the exhibition of Mexican agricultural and manufactured products maintained here by Lazaro Basch, commercial agent of the Mexican government. The consul general expects to carry on his work in co-operation with the San Francisco chamber of commerce.

Although he has spent years in public life, having served as governor of the state of Nuevo Leon and later as treasurer of the republic, Consul General Zambrano, who, incidentally, bears a striking resemblance to President Carranza, says he is primarily a business man, and realizes the quickest way to inspire mutual confidence and good will between the business men of the two countries is to get them started doing business together. Mexican business men have no hostility toward Americans and would rather buy in this country than from European firms, he said, but American firms must be alive to the fact that the Europeans are bending every effort to capture Mexican orders.

Bolshevik Ready To Launch Spring Offensive, Belief

Warsaw, Mar. 22.—(By the Associated Saturday) launched repeated attacks along various parts of the Polish front. These are considered by the military authorities to be preliminary to the long heralded general spring offensive. The attacks were repulsed by the Poles, nine hundred bolsheviks being taken prisoner in the two days fighting.

Slideshow Closes Canal

Panama, Mar. 23.—The Panama canal has been closed for two days because of a landslide in the Cucaracha section of the waterway, according to an official announcement. Dredges are expected to clear away the debris and make the canal safe for ships by Thursday.

G.O.P. Liberals May Break and Form New Party

Washington, Mar. 23.—Warning that "republican liberals" might form a new political party to "fight houbou autonomy" in an effort to restore individual liberty was sounded in the senate today by Senator France, republican, Maryland.

With repeal of national prohibition and the espionage act as the chief planks in its tentative platform, Senator France declared that liberals need not hesitate to "raise the battle against the reactionary forces of autocracy and un-American bounboner."

"The democratic party, under autocratic leadership," he said, "ingloriously abandoned the sound doctrine of the sovereignty of the states, voted without scruple huge powers to the executive, who in violation of the constitution and of every cherished principle of liberty created the most powerful despot in the world."

"If the republican party shall not now become the party of liberalism and of liberty," he declared, "then there must be a new liberal party which shall express the aspirations of the millions of Americans who now demand restoration of their liberty and of their liberties."

Along with repeal of the prohibition amendment Senator France urged "reconsideration" of the whole subject, with local option and use of "certain alcoholic beverages."

Some of the planks were: Operation of railroads by representative of capital, labor and the public, under interstate commerce commission supervision.

Rejection of the "iniquitous" treaty of Versailles and immediate establishment of peace with Germany.

Reduction of the high cost of living, with economy of federal expenditures and reduced taxes.

A navy second to none and a system of military training, but postponement of immediate universal training.
