Medford, Or., Mar. 25.—Some time after a school board meeting at the high school last night which adjourned at 10:30 p. m., the high school building was opened by removing a door from the hinges and the school auditorium was plastered with fresh field gray paint. Desks and seats were daubed and several buckets of paint were emptied on the platform.

High school sessions were conducted as usual today however, by using other rooms.

The outrage is regarded by the school board as a part of the student propaganda against Superintendent William Davernport and the recent discharge of a score of teachers.

Local authorities have been put on the case and arrests are expected today.

Commercial Club Votes Money For Entertainment

Directors of the Salem Commercial club at their weekly meeting Wednesday evening authorized an expenditure of not to exceed \$750 for co-operation with the Cherrians and Shriners in entertaining the Shriners on their visit to Salem during the Portland Rose Show and for participation in the parade at Portland. Co-operation of the community in providing lunch boxes for the 6000 visiting Shriners will be asked. The lunch will be served at Marion park.

A committee was appointed to request the mayor to issue a proclamation declaring Shriners day a public holiday. Details of the entertainment will be looked after by a joint committee of Cherrians and Shriners.
