High Prices Force Consolidation Of Roseburg Papers

Roseburg, Or., Mar. 27.—Announcement is made here of the consolidation of the Roseburg News and the Roseburg Review. The merger will become effective April 1, the announcement says, incorporation articles calling for the publication to be known as the Roseburg News-Review. The Review is the oldest paper in southern Oregon, the News formerly the Plaindealer being almost as old, it is said. L. Wimberly, editor of the Review, B. W. Bates and son, Bert G. Bates of the News, are the incorporators in the sum of \$30,000. Economic business policies are the reasons for the consolidation, it is said. Walter S. Fisher retires from the Review. The new paper will be published from the office of the News.
