Ask Portland to Take Choice of Transit Evils

If the Portland city commission desires to ignore the recommendations contained in the recent order of the Oregon public service commission for a solution of Portland's street railway problem and follow the lead of City Attorney W. F. LaRoche in the only other alternative available—high fares for the car riders—"much time and energy will be saved to all by frankly saying so."

This, in substance, is the gist of a statement issued here last night by Commissioners Fred G. Buchtel and Fred A. Williams in reply to the attack launched by LaRoche against the proposal of the commission for city ownership of the rails of the street car company as a solution of Portland's rapid transit problem which LaRoche has characterized as unconstitutional.

Although the commissioners do not care to "assume that there is any desire on the part of the councilmanic committee to evade a responsibility," as represented by the acceptance of the commission's recommendations, the eleventh hour opinion of Attorney LaRoche "came as a distinct surprise," in view of the many conferences and hearings wherein this same point has been raised in the presence of LaRoche and the many opportunities he has had to offer his objections to this plan before.

The recommendations contained in the recent order "contemplate neither tribute nor subsidy to the company nor the advancing of moneys for its benefit, but we advocate a plan designed to relieve the car rider among all who share the benefits thus assuring a maximum service at a minimum fare," the statement reads.

If, however, these recommendations do not meet with the approval of the Portland city commission, and the commissioners here regard the opinion of LaRoche as in effect technically discrediting these recommendations, there is nothing "to prevent the city's committee from advancing such solution of the problem as they must have in mind and presenting it to the electorate, with their endorsement, at the May election, in lieu of the plan submitted by the state regulatory body."

The statement of the commission was based on newspaper stories of the opinion of LaRoche discrediting the commission's recommendations, as follows:

Liberia Turned Germans Out and Took All Property

London, April 1.—Liberia is said to have been the only state at war with Germany which expelled every German from within its gates and sequestered all their property. Before the war there were about 300 German citizens in Monrovia, the capital, and Liberia was rapidly becoming a German protectorate, says Alan Bourchier Lethbridge, in the Daily Telegraph. The Germans, he adds, controlled a giant wireless plant and evidently had made arrangements to use Liberia as a link in the chain of colonial possessions.

Their places now are being rapidly taken by Spaniards and Mr. Lethbridge predicts that if Spanish immigration into Liberia continues, Spain will have the largest foreign colony in the country.

Trotzky's Special Train Elaborate One of 14 Coaches

London, April 1.—The special train of Leon Trotzky, the chief of the Russian Red army, is a most elaborate affair, consisting of fourteen cars and two powerful engines. It is supplied with a wireless installation capable of receiving communications from Nauca Lyons and London. One of its most interesting fittings is a printing office which prints Trotzky's paper "On The War." The greatest curiosity of the train is the "garage" which contains six cars, one a powerful French automobile which belonged to the late Emperor Nicholas.

The escort on the train consists of 250 infantrymen, a whole company of machine gunners, as Trotzky, with his train has often been near the front and has several times been in danger of his life. The train also contains a library and a dining car.

Iron River Court To Capitalize Its Day In Limelight

Iron River, Mech., April 1.—Iron River, scene of the "whiskey rebellion," is planning to capitalize its very brief day of fame and leave a lasting remembrance of the comedy-melodramatic clash between state and federal officials which for seven days caused Iron River to displace the capitals of the world in the day's news.

A bronze "victory medal" for the veterans of the bloodless clash, between Major A. V. Dalrymple, federal prohibitionist, and Prosecuting Attorney Martin S. McDonough, will be struck, it county commissioners carry out plans they are considering.

Lowden Has Not Filed In Oregon

Governor Lowden, republican candidate for the presidential nomination, has not yet filed in Oregon, it was announced at the state house today.

Petitions for his nomination, however, it is understood here, and it is held likely that he will waive the formality of filing himself, permitting his nomination to come through the petitions.
