

Committee Vote Favors Soldier Relief Measure

Washington, Apr. 1.—By a decisive vote, the House today decided to recommend passage of soldier relief legislation with probable provision for a cash bonus. Details of the plan will be referred to sub-committees. The committee's program declares against any kind of issue, and the funds to carry out the relief plans should be raised by sales or luxury taxes.
