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Alaska is Scene Of Oil Stampede As Bill Passes

Seattle, Wash., April 2.—Hundreds of oil chasers embracing thousands of acres of land along the Alaskan coast, from Mount St. Elias on the boundary line of Yukon territory to the Alaska Peninsula in the west, have been lured by locators in the few weeks since President Wilson signed the oil and off land leasing measure, according to reports from Seward, O. Klovick, Anchorage and other leading cities in the North.

News of the bill's signing, eagerly awaited for weeks, started a stampede that "old timers" said rivaled the gold rushes of earlier days. Seward stampedees flocked to the oil regions of the Ketchikan peninsula, to Cold Bay, on Shelikof strait and to other districts along the Southwestern coast. From Coorvora the rush was in the direction of Katalik and Yakutatka, in the basins of the Bering and Malaspina glaciers.

Elaborate preparations had been made to relay word that the bill had been signed. At Kodiak, locators were notified by wireless from Seward, and left in gas boats that had been chartered for weeks, bound for the oil regions. Caravans, also, had kept high powered launches under charter that so time might be lost in making locations.

While many indications of rich oil deposits had been found along the coast, the only development of any importance had been at Katalik, where an "English company" drilled into oil and secured a fractional claim of about 34 acres. Discouraged by conservation orders from Washington, the company after expending nearly half million dollars in drilling and development, abandoned work and sold out to a holding company. A number of wells upon the one patented claim have been producing oil since 1912. The product being chiefly distilled used by fishing boats.

Pair Drifting In Wrecked Plane Rescued Today

Baltimore, Md., Apr. 1.—After having been adrift in a seaplane for 14 hours without food or water, Major Sidney E. Parker of the British army, and Miss Blanche Fraser arrived here today on the steamer Hilton, by which they were picked up on Sunday last.

Captain Carey said he found Major Parker and Miss Fraser in their plane about 15 miles southeast of Jupiter, on the Florida coast.

Major Parker refused to talk of his trip or experience, but Miss Fraser said they left Palm Beach on Saturday for Miami Island, in the Bahamas, in the seaplane to take dinner with members of the Miami Gun club on the island, which is 50 miles distant.

All was going well until they ran into a heavy fog. The machine ran out of gasoline and Major Parker was forced to descend. Miss Fraser said she is a native of Belgium and had seen service during the world war.

Oregon Place For Americans Only Is Lee's Slogan
