

18 Planes Given to California For Fire Patrol

San Francisco, April 5.—The 18th division of 34 airplanes, two of them to be motor driven equipped with wireless telephone sets, have been turned over by the Army to the United States forestry service and will begin fire patrol duty on May 1, the service announced here today.

The seven planes will direct forest fire fighting from the air, connecting with portable land sets, while all of the other planes will be equipped with wireless telegraphy sets which will connect with fixed land stations at certain specified points.

A flying school for forest rangers is being conducted at March Field, Riverside, the principal studies being airplane scouting and wireless telegraphy.

Red Bluff, Matter Field, Fresno and March Field will each be a station for four airplanes. The two most machines will have no designated base. Landing places will be established at Rockwell Field, San Diego, Monterey, Shasta county; Lakeport, Lake county; Alturas, Modoc county; Sonora, Tuolumne county; Bakersfield, Santa Barbara.

A daily wireless telegram report will be compiled from all of the airplanes and submitted to Colonel H. H. Arnold, chief of the army air service in the western department, with headquarters here. Two airplanes will be sent up daily from each base.

The directing of fire fighting by wire from airplanes from an airplane was tried last season during the fire in the Angeles national forest but without success, the service announced. The elements which caused this failure have been overcome, however, it was announced.

Rosedale.

Rosedale, April 5.—The inhabitants of Rosedale were awakened Friday night and rushed to the scene of conflagration, but it was late to save A. N. Blanton's house. The household furniture was practically all removed, even to the linens on the floor. The fire is thought to have started from an incendiary bomb dropped in the woodshed adjoining the house. Young people who were just coming home from a party would have done their best to have saved the house had there been any water available. The damage is estimated at \$10,000 and is only partially covered by insurance.

National Retail Dry Goods Men Meet in Frisco

The board of directors of the National Retail Dry Goods Association met on Friday March 26th, authorized the holding of the annual spring meeting in San Francisco. This will be the first meeting of the national association ever held west of St. Louis and it is expected to draw a large attendance of merchants from all over the country, and especially from the west.

The convention will be held late in May or early in June and the dates will be arranged so that the party of distinguished British merchants who are to tour the country under the direction of the National Retail Dry Goods Association, will be in San Francisco to take part in the program.

The merchants of the Pacific coast who have been numbered among the strongest supporters of the success of the association have long been denied the holding of a meeting on the coast, but until this year the board of directors has not deemed it advisable to take the spring convention so far from the association's headquarters in New York.

The British merchants who are coming to the United States as a result of the national retail dry goods association's invitation extended to the drapers' chamber of trade of the United Kingdom, will sail from England April 18th and will reach New York early in May.
