San Francisco, April 6.—The San Francisco team of the Pacific Coast league today opens the 1920 baseball season with the Vernon Tigers, last year's pennant winners.

William H. McCarthy, president of the league, was to pitch the first ball to Chief of Police White behind the plate.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 6.—Oakland will oppose the Los Angeles team at the opening of the Coast league season here today. A parade will precede the game and Mayor Snyder will pitch the first ball, which will be previously dropped from an airplane. If any member of either team succeeds in catching the ball, which will be dropped from a height of 250 feet, he will be awarded a silver loving cup. Every reserved seat in the stands had been sold yesterday.

Sacramento, Cal., April 6.—Public schools will be dismissed early today, public offices generally will close and business virtually will be suspended here this afternoon that all who choose may witness the game between the Sacramento and Seattle teams of the Coast league which opens the baseball season here today.

The park's seating capacity which has been enlarged to accommodate 12,000 persons is expected to be taxed. There will be an informal parade to the park and Mayor Brown will toss the first ball.

It was indicated Seattle's batter would be Gardner or Irenton and Kohler, Mails and Cady will open for Sacramento.

### Bearcat Nine to Open Baseball Season on Friday

Villamette's first baseball game of the season will occur Friday afternoon, when the Bearcats play Chemawa on the Indians' field. The following Friday, the 13th, O. A. C. will invade Salem for a conference contest, and the following day Coach Mathews' men will play a return game in Corvallis. No further schedule has been announced for the local college team, but the season will undoubtedly be a full one.

Coach Mathews has announced that there will be practice in both baseball and track, no matter what the weather from now on, as the practice season is getting late and the teams have been almost two weeks in this way. Light practice has been held in the gym, but that is not very satisfactory. The diamond is still too wet to play on, so the men are working out on the sawdust, which is badly crowded with baseball, track and spring football going on at one time. It is probable that two or three men will be to the Columbia indoor meet Saturday. Fisher will compete in the distance runs, but no others have been announced.

### Chicago Expects Normal Railroad Service Saturday

Chicago, April 6.—Railroad managers estimated today that traffic in Chicago terminals, crippled by an unauthorized strike of switchmen on eighteen roads here, and Sunday's blizzard, would be nearly normal by Saturday, following the arrival of yardmen sent by the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen to take the place of the strikers.

A shutdown at the stock yards because of light cattle receipts threatened to throw 10,000 men temporarily out of work. Morris and company stated that 75 per cent of all their employees would be laid off if present conditions continued for a few more days.

John Grunau, leader of the strikers, claimed that 15,500 switchmen had quit in the Chicago district. He said the strikers were financially able to stay out a month. Railroad managers asserted not more than 2,500 men were out.

A. F. Whitney, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, said 600 brotherhood men from Cleveland and 800 from Iowa, together with surplus road crews, were ordered here.

Striking members of the Order of Railway Conductors were appealed to to return to work by S. N. Berry, Cedar Rapids, Iowa, senior vice-president of the organization.

The city's supply of dairy and farm products was cut short by an express embargo.

### Special Aviation Medical Service To Cut Fatalities

Washington, April 6.—Creation of a special aviation medical service in the army medical corps is expected materially to reduce fatalities among flyers on active service, according to an official announcement. Statistics compiled by British military authorities were quoted as showing that during the first year of the war 96 per cent of the deaths among British aviators were recorded as due to physical defects of pilots, eight per cent to defective planes and two per cent to enemy activity. After the establishment of the air medical service, which made a special study of the qualifications necessary in an aviator, the percentage of deaths due to the faults of the pilots was reduced to twelve.

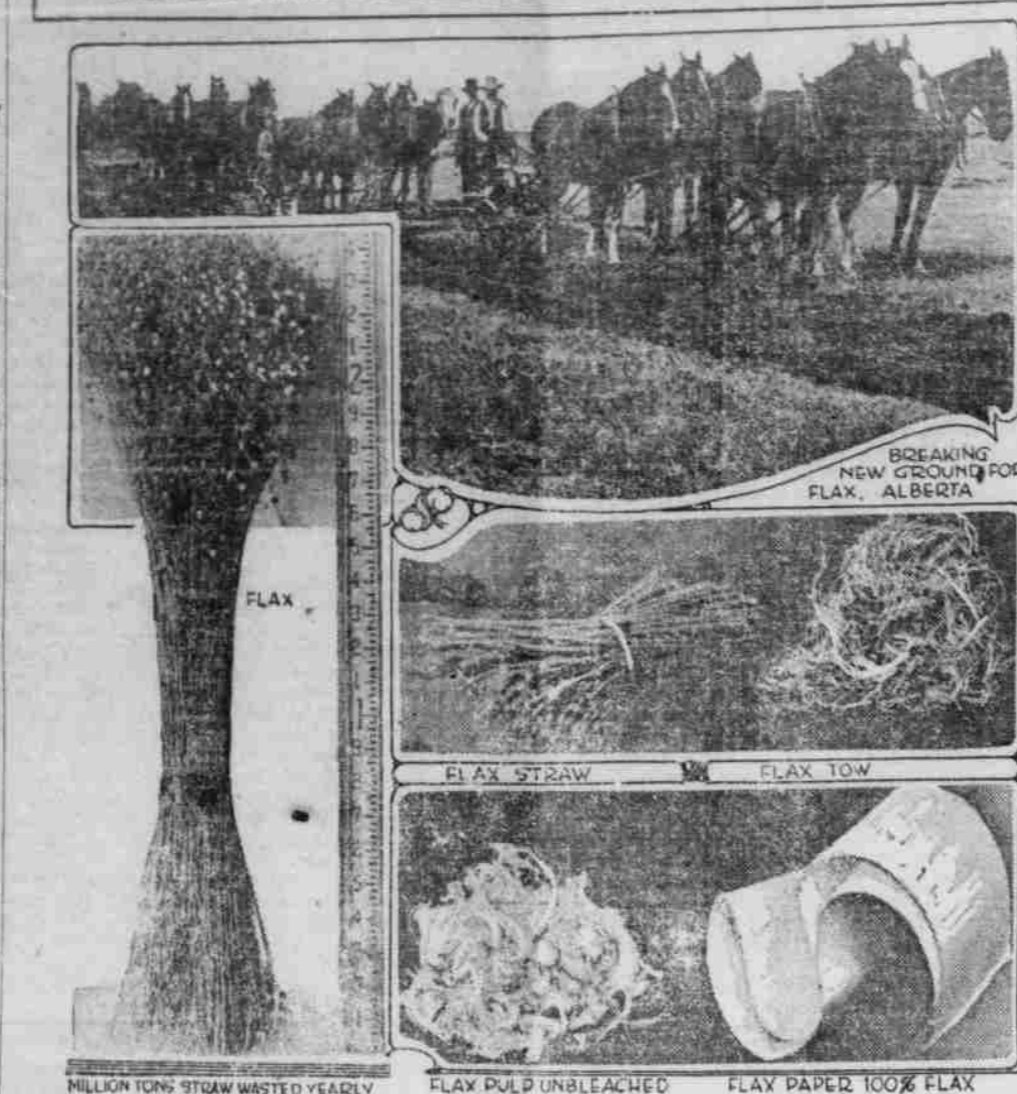

### CANADA TURNS TO LINSEED STRAW TO MAKE PAPER PULP



Canada yearly wastes 1,000,000 tons of flax straw capable of producing over 100,000 tons of paper pulp. The Dominion manufactures annually 250,000 tons of high-grade pulp, largely for export to the United States, and this can be greatly increased by using flax straw. In 1919 Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta had 1,040,000 acres of flax under cultivation, producing 7,117,000 bushels of flax seed for linseed oil and seed purposes.

The market for high-grade paper is unparalleled today and the demand far exceeds production, in spite of an increase of 150 per cent in the price of some high-grade papers. Some 20,000 acres of pulp wood limits in Canada are consumed yearly, and timber limits are rapidly increasing in value. In view of these facts the Canadian Pacific Railway has carefully investigated the use of flax straw for pulp production and the following practical plan has been worked out.

The flax straw after being threshed for linseed is sent to saw mills. Three tons of straw are converted into 1 ton of baled tow. This is sent to the pulp mill and converted to bleached or unbleached pulp, using standard equipment with a slight modification to overcome the original difficulty of removing the woody portion of the straw from the fibre. Three to 3½ tons of baled tow are needed to make 1 ton of unbleached, or 0.83 tons of bleached pulp.

The bleached pulp is of a high quality, second only to linen and the best cotton paper-making material and is suitable for strong writing and high-grade papers. Unbleached pulp has a wide range of utility for making some writing papers, flour and cement bags, etc. The total cost of manufacturing bleached pulp is \$170 to \$200 a ton, and similar material today sells at \$300 a ton.

Leading Canadian chemists and paper pulp manufacturers are convinced that the Dominion offers an unusual opportunity for the development of this industry.
